General News.

Three persons were killed at the automobile races at Indianapolis, Saturday.

One man killed and a score of persons injured by the derailing of a fast train near Youngstown, Ohio, Saturday.

W. H. Oakley, paymaster of the Franklin Construction company was shot to death and robbed of \$2000. by an unknown man at Rock, West Va. last week.

Mrs. Ada Otis, divorced wife of Thomas Otis, an Arizona mining man committed suicide by taking poison, at Los Angeles, Calif. recently.

Marion Blakely, "the incubator baby," of the St. Louis fair, has been kidnapped.

Bill Way a negro half crazed by cocaine, ran-a-muck in Monroe, La. Tuesday. Armed with a shot gun he opened fire in every direction wounding 21 citizens before being killed. After the negro fell, his body was taken to a public square and burned in the presence of several thousand people.

120 persons, mostly women and children, were drowned by the sinking of the steamer Columbia in Montevideo harbor, Tuesday.

M. Blierot, the Frenchman who crossed the English Channel in an aeroplane recently, broke the record for a single lap at Rheims Tuesday, making it in 8 minutes 42-5 seconds. The distance was 61-5 miles.

Women of Sweden have presented a petition to the king begging him to intercede to bring about arbitration of the dispute between laborers and their employers that resulted in the strike now in progress.

Charles Alfred Bryce, the journalist who attained notoriety as publisher of the forged Morey letter in the Garfield campaign of 1880, is dead in a Jersey City hospital.

September 2, is to be "Smith's Day" at the Seattle fair.

Three persons were killed and six injured in a railroad accident at Bakersfield, Calif. Wednesday.

By allowing bees to sting him on the bare arms and legs, J. B. Webster of Roxbury, Mass. is recovering from an attack of paralysis.

Big Fruit Specimens

The last of the week, Chas. Bland, living west of town, was exhibiting samples of apples, the largest of which was 14 1/2 inches in diameter, and weighs 1 1/2 lbs. Mr. Bland passed them around for inspection previous to placing them in cold storage to be preserved for exhibition purposes. The specimens were from comparatively young trees, set out by the proprietor himself within the past six years.—Tidings.
