

PORTLAND LETTER

Many special features at livestock fair--Oregon wool crop brings four millions.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 9 (Special) Extraordinary attractions are booked for the coming annual meet of the Portland Fair and Livestock Show, during the week of September 20-25, and the event is expected to be the biggest of its kind ever held in the Northwest. Harness and running races, livestock show and special features will occupy the six days. Probably the biggest days will be Thursday, September 23, which is Willamette Valley day, and Friday, September 24, Columbia River Valley day.

The first will be open day for all the towns of Western Oregon where the livestock industry and the harness racing game have been so well developed of recent years. Officials and commercial bodies of the various towns will co-operate with the committee in making it a big occasion. The following day, too, will be marked by the presence of thousands of out-of-town guests, as attractive railroad rates have been made from all points. In addition Friday will be ladies' day and special events will be carded.

President Wehrung of the association has taken up the work of organizing his committee and they will get to work at once to make the forthcoming meet the most notable ever held in this section of the country. The meet will be held on the grounds of the association east of this city. This year's sessions will, undoubtedly, have a marked effect in building up the livestock industry in the Pacific Northwest.

Oregon's many products that are now being gathered at the annual harvest are adding largely to the wealth of the state and the various items that enter into the yearly return from the soil make a fine showing individually and collectively. The state's wool clip, which has now been about all marketed, will put \$4,000,000 in the pockets of sheep raisers of the state. The year's clip amounted to 20,450,000 pounds of fine quality and good prices were realized, Eastern Oregon wool getting a maximum price of 23 cents and the Willamette Valley crop reaching a top price of 25 cents. The season was ideal for wool growers. Fleeces were heavier than usual and the grade of the product is high. The wool money will be divided quite generally throughout the state.

STOCK YARDS

Open at Portland, Sept. 15—Will be of untold value to farmers of Oregon.

The opening of the Portland Union Stock Yards Sept. 15, is an epoch in the live stock industry of the Pacific Northwest. The creation of a place of barter and sale where there is every day in the year an active demand for all of the live stock offered, means much to the farmers and ranchers of this section of the United States. The nearest market of this class is at Denver. The establishment of live stock markets such as afforded by the Portland Union Stock Yards has added millions of dollars to the value of the live stock tributary to Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph, St. Louis, Fort Worth and Denver, and history will repeat itself at Portland.

Live Stock sells every business day in the year and the cash that is paid out to the farmers and ranchers filters through every channel of the country's commerce. There is no better way to get grain to market and get a good price for it than in the hide of a meat animal—a method of marketing that

BIG LOGS FOR CHINA

Twenty-four logs 105 feet long and 12 feet in diameter to be packed six miles by coolies.

A remarkable shipment of big Oregon logs were loaded on board the steamship Emma S. Dollar at Portland this week. The logs are very large, being 105 feet long and 40 feet in circumference. There are 24 of the big sticks and they are being consigned to China, where they will be used to rebuild the temple Ling Yen, the most famous house of worship in all China. The Chinese government purchased them here for the purpose. They will be rafted up the Grand Canal in China for 200 miles and taken overland six miles to the temple. The only possible way to get the big sticks this distance is for coolies to carry them on their backs. This seems impossible but it is actually done in China in transporting big timbers over mountain trails, as will be done in this case.

RACES AT THE PORTLAND FAIR.

The race entries at the Portland fair this year excel those of last year, and the best racing on the Coast is promised. There are races for all classes, and a good entry list has been received in each event from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California and British Columbia. When a large amount of money is spent for one race, much more interest always centers in it. The 2:03 pace for \$2500 is one of the big money purses, and in it twenty of the fastest pacers on the coast are entered. Adam G. recently paced a mile in 2:07 1/4 in California and will be well in front. Solano Boy paced a mile in a winning race at Salinas in 2:07 1/4 and will give Adam G. a good race. Ray O'Light, who made the Coast record for 3-year-olds here last year, will be a contender with the above. Hymettus and Morrix will also be in the fight. General Heurterus and Lord Lovelace will be strong contenders.

The 2:12 trot is the big trot and is for \$2500. There are 24 good horses entered. Some have already been mentioned and some others are Della Derby who is racing in California; also Era, who won a five-heat race and made fast time. There are many other good ones that will start.
