PROTECT THE PUBLIC.

It is probably too late to seek to prevent further consolidation of water power and water rights already in private ownership. But the rise of the huge trust gives emphatic warning, to every State and to Congress, to lose no time in passing such laws as will prevent further absolute appropriation or other acquisition in perpetuity of water power still owned by the States, respectively, or attaching to public lands of the United States. All such power should remain in inalienable public ownership, subject to proper use by corporations and individuals, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, due compensation to be paid to the State or Federal Government for any valuable privilege granted.—Ex.

The fire Thursday should serve to illustrate several points of interest to every citizen of this town.

First: That the present water supply is insufficient for fire protection. Second: That the fire company should be supplied with hose of sufficient strength to stand the pressure of the pump. Third: That some system of alarm is needed whereby the firemen can be summoned in case of fire, immediately upon discovery of the fire.

Had the supply of water in the first well been sufficient, or the hose not been twice burned, and the firebell struck at once, the building would very likely have been saved. Respectfully referred to the City council. We do not censure the fire company or any of the citizens, each and all were ready and willing to help and done the best possible with the apparatus provided.

A barber in a neighboring town was called before the grand jury in session at the courthouse and fined in the sum of \$75, for furnishing liquor to minors. Four young persons of the same place were also examined by the grand jury in regard to a similar offence. While the law allows the sale of liquors by persons legally licensed it specially prohibits the sale or giving away to minors and our court should receive the support of all citizens in its efforts to enforce the law.

James D. Fay who has been conducting the Gold Hill News, has resigned his position as editor and turned the paper over to those who are financing it. Mr. Fay gave the people of Gold Hill a bright, newsy paper and it is to be regretted that he did not receive the necessary patronage.

The verdict of the jury in the land location case tried last week was most just and the defendant is certainly fortunate in getting off by returning the money paid him as location fees, together with costs of the suit. Obtaining money by false representation deserves to be classed with highway robbery and to our mind deserves similar punishment.

The coach heretofore carried on No. 225 is discontinued, local freights will pass Medford during the day instead of night of night as heretofore.
