Ten persons were seriously injured by the bursting of a boiler at the Lurline Baths in San Francisco, Calif. Monday.

Robert S. Lovett has been elected chairman of the executive board of Union Pacific directors to fill the position made vacant by the death of E. H. Harriman.

Arrangements are completed for the disinterment of the body of James N. Sutton, Jr. the purpose being to ascertain whether the deceased officer's right arm was broken, thus making it impossible for him to have fired the shot that cost him his life.

St. John's Catholic Church at New Orleans, was destroyed by fire, as the result of a stroke of lightning Sunday. Loss \$200,000.

A Washington dispatch to the New York Tribune says that it is understood that secretary Ballinger will retire from the Taft Cabinet.

Thirty thousand visitors are reported in Omaha, Neb. this week on account of the Eagles National convention now in session.

Francis Laur a French engineer, has invented a flying omnibus, capable of transporting merchandise and passengers and has asked the municipal council to grant him a franchise for the city of Paris.

Joe Ware was convicted of manslaughter in the Superior Court at Chehalis, Wash., last week.

The Postoffice Department will indemnify the owners of 200 pieces of registered mail lost in the sinking of the Steamer Ohio, August 25. The indemnities paid will approximate \$25 for each package lost.
