LOCAL TRAIN IN DITCH

Engineer Ed Peyton Injured in Derailment Near West Fork.

S. P. Passenger train No. 20, the Roseburg Local, which left Ashland at 7:15 Monday morning, met with a mishap one mile south of Granite, near West Fork in the Cow Creek canyon, about 10:30 o'clock. The engine was derailed and it is reported that Engineer Ed. Peyton was severely injured, being the only one on the train injured at all.

The accident was due to spreading rails, it is said.

BIG STORM SWEEP SOUTH

Louisiana swept by Hurricane—Scores of lives lost—Property loss of millions.

Scores of lives are reported lost as the result of a hurricane which swept a large portion of Louisiana, Monday.

It is impossible to give an accurate estimate of the fatalities, owing to the fact communication with the storm stricken region is cut off.

Many towns suffered great property loss. In Baton Rouge and vicinity alone, the loss will exceed \$2,000,000. The State Capital is unroofed and the building flooded. A conservative estimate places the property loss in the devastated district at ten millions.

School Notes

School has opened with a total enrollment of 169, distributed as follows: 1st and 2nd grades 47; 3rd and 4th grade 33; 5th grade 30; 6th and 7th grades 29; 8th grade 10; High School 20.

The eleventh grade has been added to the High School course. At present there are three pupils enrolled: Geo. Henry, Gladys Shaw and Ries Chapman.

We are opening this year with three new teachers. Miss Wright has the little people of grades one and two. She comes from the east where she has been engaged in primary work. Miss Neil, a graduate of our school, has third and fourth grades. Mr. Joy, who comes to us from the Normal School at Ashland, has the High School work.

Miss Minnie Lewis of Ashland has been secured to take the 8th grade and part of the High School work. She is a graduate of the Normal School at Ashland and holds a life diploma.

Pupils and teachers are taking up the work with a will and the board of directors are standing ready to do anything in their power to help. Under such conditions as these the school year is bound to prove a profitable one.

The 9th grade book-keeping class is getting nicely started. Ries Chapman, who took the commercial course in the Butte, Mont., High School last year, has charge of the banking and office work.

The school appreciates very much the flag given us by the old soldiers and sailors. It is floating every day from our flag staff.

The tennis court is kept busy most of the time. Some of the boys are getting to be very good players.

Considerable interest is being taken in basket ball. The students are fast learning to handle the ball and to throw baskets. There is plenty of material for a good girls' team and the way the boys take hold indicates that their team will not be at all slow.

The board at a special meeting granted an additional much needed teacher. The addition of the eleventh grade made more work, giving the principal thirteen classes a day. By the new arrangement our school may now be placed on the accredited list and our graduates may enter the University and like colleges without an examination. We can now do work equal to any High School in the county.

News of the State

The sawmill at Coles Valley, near Roseburg, is to be rebuilt.

Baker City is justly proud of its water system which attracts buyers of residence lots.

Cottage Grove comes to the front with \$150,000 in bonds for water and streets. It pays.

Roseburg has just completed one school building and needs another which will be provided next year.

Medford expects considerable improvement in values of business lots from the completion of a railroad now under construction to Butte Falls.

Although grain turns out well in the Rogue River Valley the profits from fruit and intensive farming is steadily reducing the area of the wheat lands. Even alfalfa is said to pay better when cropped for seed.

Oregon has contributed eight millions to the reclamation funds of the general government and gets back but three. The expenditure of the missing five millions in Oregon would create fifty in land values.

Ninety box cars, filled with through-bred stock from the Salem state fair, were shipped to the Portland livestock show Saturday.

Fred George, accused of being responsible for the death of H. M. Pullen, was given a hearing at The Dalles, Friday and bound over in the sum of \$3,000.

Four weddings in one day, was the record at Milton, Friday.

The school board of Echo has let the contract for the erection of a two-story, re-enforced concrete school building.

Eugene is erecting a new hotel which when finished will be the pride of the town. It is constructed of red pressed brick, 116 by 160 feet, four stories and basement.

Requisition papers were received last week upon the governor of California for the return to this state of Ching Mon, a Chinaman, who passed a bad check in Portland, Sept. 8th.

Walter Arnold a prominent railroad contractor, has placed an order with a Eugene firm for 100,000 fruit trees for his ranch near Yakima, Wash.

Two new trains have been placed on the branch line between Shariko and The Dalles.

Mrs. Anna May Henry who died at Oakland, Ore., last week was one of the oldest residents of the state, having been born August 19, 1810, she was at the time of her death over 99 years of age. She had resided in Douglas county for the past 30 years.

The Condor Water and Power Co. are opening an immense granite quarry at Gold Ray. A siding 800 feet long has been put in and shipping will be commenced this week.

Dolly Ferrara, aged 29 was killed at Portland, Sunday morning in an automobile accident.

Thieves at Medford.

Medford, Ore., Sept. 22—The largest robbery in the history of Medford took place last night when the Deuel & Kentner department store was entered and goods to the value of \$1000 stolen. Among the goods taken were eight suits of clothes, 20 pairs of shoes and a dozen suit cases. No clues have been found of the goods or robbers.

Last week Mr. Kentner's residence in Medford was destroyed by fire. Monday his timber tract near Leland was destroyed by a forest fire.

KILLED BY THE CARS

Stolen ride costs man his life.

Patrick McCarthy and his chum, Tom Curtin, jumped a freight at Medford Saturday night, going north, at Grants Pass Curtin missed his friend and at Glendale started back to find him.

At 6 o'clock Sunday morning he was discovered with one hand severed and lying near him, at or near Gold Ray, by the crew of No. 11 and was brought to Medford where both arms were amputated, one at the elbow, the other at the shoulder and although everything possible to medical science was done for him it was of no avail. He died Sunday afternoon.

The unfortunate man was a native of Ireland and was aged about 30 years, he had been in this country about 11 years.

The whereabouts of his parents or friends are unknown.
