A yearling calf was found killed by a gunshot wound near Port Orford. This is but the logical result of allowing small boys to run around with high pressure rifles, says the Tribune. The lumber industry of Lane county is in better condition now than it has been for a number of years, says the Register. Mills are running steadily and there is big demand for all the material being turned out. The Dalles Optimist: The era of railroad building setting in in Oregon will not cut much figure in the census next spring. But wait until 1920. Oregon will then loom up with nearly as great a population as Washington. Threshing is about finished in Summer Lake and so far as we have learned crops have turned out very well, says the Leader. No threshing has yet been done in this valley, but it is expected that crops will turn out better than was looked for earlier in the season. The Booth-Kelly company's big log drive of 9,000,000 feet which has been coming down the river for some time is now being taken into the race and pond at Coburg mills. There will be enough logs to fill the pond and race to overflowing and will keep the mill busy for a long time.—Journal.

SEPTEMBER COURT (CONTINUED) The suit of Whetstone vs. Rogue River Valley R. R. Co., a corporation, was concluded Friday. Verdict for the defendant. Southern Pacific Railroad Co. vs. Parker. Action to recover money due on balance of a freight bill. This suit grew out of a dispute over a freight bill, Parker had shipped a carload of household goods and livestock from Arizona to Ashland, paying \$200 in advance charges thereon. After the arrival of the goods at Ashland the company claimed an additional \$164, which Parker refused to pay as he had already received the goods. A number of precedents were cited, interstate commerce rules quoted, etc. The Court instructed the jury to find a verdict for the plaintiff. James Wilson who had been found guilty of burglary, was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary. The grand jury found indictments against Olsen of Gold Hill and Mark Whipple of Woodville and their cases will come up for hearing soon. The grand jury has completed its labors, filed its report and been discharged. The report states that of the eight transcripts submitted from the justice courts three true bills were found. Of other cases investigated 27 indictments were returned, making a total of 30 for the term. The offices of the county officials were inspected and everything found in apparent good condition. The grand jury recommends that the yard in the vicinity of the jail be cleaned up, also the outhouses. The halls and office rooms of the court house are not as neat as they should be and improvement is suggested. Sheriff Mulkey, Deputy Dow and District Atty. Mulkey are commended for zealous work in assisting the jury and court, the attorney being specially commended for his efforts to stop the sale of liquors to boys and girls under 21 years of age. State of Oregon vs. Chas. H. Walsworth. Case called for trial Monday morning. Jury empaneled and sworn, opening statements made by attorneys, map of the farm and scene of the tragedy exhibited and explained to the jury, request made that jury be taken to view the place where shooting occurred. Court instructed sheriff to procure necessary carriages and convey jury and defendant (if the latter so desires) to the scene and return to the court house in the afternoon. After viewing the scene of the tragedy the jury returned and trial was resumed. A number of witnesses were called by the prosecution who testified as to the shooting, etc. The State rested and the defense introduced testimony to show that the defendant was acting in self defense, the defendant claiming that the first wound inflicted in the affray was upon him, that he was shot twice while standing with hands raised above his head. The trial of this case was delayed all day Wednesday and Thursday forenoon on account of the illness of one of the jurors who was taken sick Tuesday night. Thursday afternoon the hearing was resumed, several witnesses were examined and part of the testimony given at the former trial in 1908 was read, guns used in the fracas were identified and offered to the jury for examination. Dr. Pickel testified to dressing the wounds of the defendant after the shooting and identified several scars as the result of such wounds. Court adjourned until nine o'clock Friday morning. Court convened Friday at the hour named and it appearing that by reason of illness one of the jurors was unable to serve, the jury was discharged and further hearing in the case postponed until Monday, October 11th. 1909.
