Fitch and Coburn Convicted for Violating Local Option Law.

August Fitch, indicted for violation of law, in selling liquor in prohibition territory was tried in the circuit court at Grants Pass and after a hotly contested trial lasting several days was found guilty and fined \$200. Mr. Coburn, an ex-mayor of Grants Pass was tried on a similar charge and also convicted.

Capt. J. E. Verdin, indicted for bootlegging, has fled the country after converting his holdings into cash.

Rufus Reed plead guilty to carrying concealed weapons, fined \$25. Henry Triplett plead guilty to same charge and was fined \$15. and costs.

COAST UN-PROTECTED

President Taft Says Fleet Will Not be Kept on this Coast.

In his address at San Francisco Tuesday night the president talked on two subjects of much interest to the business people of the coast. He endorses a ship subsidy for the merchant marine and suggest that a mail line subsidy be tried first and if it proved successful, further subsidies should then be provided.

In regard to battleships he intimated very plainly that the Pacific Coast need not expect a battleship fleet in the Pacific during his administration, unless conditions were changed greatly. In closing, Taft said:

"If you will guarantee that all the attacks are coming from this side, the government will send you the fleet."

He said he believed the opening of the Panama canal would double the efficiency of the present navy by making the sailing distance so much shorter between Atlantic and Pacific ports.

He said he was sure the Panama canal would be opened by January 1, 1915, and added:

"I am hoping fervently that it will be a considerable time before that."

General News.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad has ordered 200 all steel passenger cars for use on its lines.

Leon Greenberg, an assayer, dropped dead at San Francisco, while delivering an address, Sunday night.

A two-days conference was recently held in Indianapolis, to devise means to enforce the laws against "blind tigers" social clubs, etc. in territory which has been voted "dry" under the local option law.

ELUDES OFFICERS

Posse on trail of Meyers returns to Salem--All traces lost.

Both posses on the track of the fugitive George Meyers, returned to Salem Tuesday with the confession that they had been completely baffled. The city was surprised. The trail of the murderer was lost near Silver Creek falls. Chief of Police Gibson and party returned shortly after noon with the information that Sheriff Minto and his party had lost the trail. During the evening Sheriff Minto returned with the word that the hunt had been given up because of lack of information regarding the probable whereabouts of Meyers.

The last positive information of his whereabouts was obtained from a rural mail carrier who had met Meyers at a watering trough about two miles east of Victor Point on Saturday. Meyers had then inquired the way to Sublimity and after that had been completely lost to the searchers. This meeting at the watering trough was only a few hours after Meyers had stopped at the home of Peter Luth and obtained his breakfast and after he had been seen at the Victor Point store 10 miles from Salem.

HONESTY IN PULPIT

Is Easy Says New York Pastor.

Rev. C. F. Aked, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church of New York, in referring to the remarks of a minister who resigned his pastorate to become a street car conductor, giving as his reason the statement that it was impossible for a minister of the gospel to be honest, says:

"An honest man will be honest anywhere, and a minister of the gospel has fewer temptations than any other man."

The minister declared that for every six persons driven from the church because of offensive truth, 1000 others are attracted.

Dr. Aked admitted, however, that ministers are underpaid, and declared that salaries should be doubled. He said:

"I do not believe the New York ministers are afraid to denounce the misconduct of their congregations, personally I believe there has been enough denunciation from the pulpit. The preaching of a hell-centered religion is a thing of the past."

STRIKES A LANDSLIDE

Wreck on North Bank near Sandal--Engineer Killed--Five Others Injured.

At 11 o'clock Tuesday night, train No. 4, which left Portland at 5:40 P. M. for Spokane over the North Bank road, struck a slide in the rock cut three miles west of Sandal, about 140 miles from Portland, and the engine, baggage car and three deadhead Pullman tourist cars were derailed.

Engineer C. A. Bigsby was killed and Fireman J. F. Bear, Baggageman F. A. Kohler and Mail Clerk H. C. Pettit were injured. The engineer fell beneath the boiler and roasted to death. Fireman Bear and Mail Clerk Pettit jumped but failed to clear the wreckage and were pinned under the mail and express cars when they piled up over the engine. A tramp and a colored porter were bruised but none of the passengers were injured.

Wrecking trains were sent out from Vancouver and Pasco as soon as word of the accident was received and arrangements were made to bring the dead engineer and the injured fireman, baggage man and mail clerk to Vancouver.

The train hit the rock with great force and the engine fell on its side in the rock cut. The baggage car was badly damaged and one of the Pullman cars was completely demolished. The second Pullman had both ends stove in and the third car was more or less wrecked. Had the Pullmans been occupied, a number of persons would undoubtedly be killed or badly injured.

AIRSHIP NO VALUE

Prominent shipbuilder says that an aircraft offers no danger to warships--Electric gun will be weapon of future.

Louis Nixon, one of America's foremost ship contractors, does not believe the aeroplane will ever become a factor in modern warfare. He is convinced that an aircraft offers no danger to the latest warships. He believes that the time is not far distant when an electric gun will be invented which will fire a thunderbolt that will shock to death every man that happens to be in its path.

This, he said, was the direct menace of the future. He declares that this gun was sure to come, when electricity should be better understood than it is at present.

In Nixon's opinion the aeroplane may be so perfected as finally to become practical for purposes of observation, but he does not believe it will ever become an instrument of destruction.

For Hunters.

By request we publish the following synopsis of the game laws as applying to hunting in Jackson county.

Open season, for killing buck deer: Aug. 1st to Nov. 1st. Unlawful to hunt or kill female deer at any time. Limit five deer in one season.

Gray squirrel: Oct. 1, to Jan. 1st.

Ducks: from Oct. 15, to Feb. 15th.

Geese: from Oct. 1, to March 1st.

Grouse, Native Pheasants, Ruffed Grouse or partridge: Oct. 15, to Nov. 15th.

Quail, in Jackson county: Oct. 15th to Dec. 15th.

Unlawful to kill or have in possession more than 10 in one day or 20 in seven days.

Hunting deer with dogs prohibited. Unlawful to sell or have in possession

for sale, or to ship beyond the boundaries of the State of Oregon, animals, birds or fowl, except ring-necked or Chinese pheasants, raised in captivity for breeding purposes.

Unlawful to have in possession any game animals, birds or fowls, during time same is protected, except for scientific purposes.

Unlawful to hunt or fish, at any time without license.

Unlawful to enter into any standing or growing grain, or upon any enclosed premises, not the property of the person entering into same, with intent to catch, recover, take or kill, any bird, fowl or wild animal protected by law, or permit any dog or dogs to do so, without permission of persons in charge of such premises.

The penalties for the violation of the game laws vary from \$25. to \$250.

It is made the duty of Sheriff, deputies, and constables to enforce all laws for the protection of game.
