CIRCUIT COURT. (CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE.) shotgun while in the door of house. Walsworth testified that he was standing in the door with right arm up-lifted, asking that trouble be stopped when he received a charge of shot in face and arm from shotgun fired by James Mankin. Witness removed his clothing and exhibited to the jury the marks of shot wounds on inside of arm and on face and neck, the undershirt worn by defendant was also offered in evidence showing conclusively that shot holes could not have been made by shot fired when defendant was in the position claimed by the state. It was one of those physical demonstrations of facts which are impossible of controversion. The guns of defendant were also examined and showed no marks of any shot on the woodwork, which also was a corroboration of the story told by Walsworth. The taking of testimony closed and the case was summed up for the state by Attorney Reames, who disclaimed any intention to injure the defendant but warned the jury against undue sympathy for the defendant or his family. Mr. Kelley for the defense followed with a short resume of the evidence, stating that the testimony of many of the witnesses was not infallible. He then donned the shirt worn by the defendant at the time of the shooting and demonstrated that the shot holes therein could not have been made while the wearer was in the act of aiming a rifle as claimed by the state. Mr. Smith for the defense submitted some suggestions in regard to charge, after which he addressed the jury, reviewing the evidence in the case in an able manner and making a strong plea in behalf of his client. Court adjourned until nine o'clock Friday morning. The judge in announcing the adjournment gave positive orders that every precaution should be taken to guard the jury from intercourse with anyone, in fact during the entire trial, Judge Hanna has taken special pains to preserve the jury from any and all outside influence. Friday morning District Attorney Mulkey delivered his closing address to the jury, making an eloquent appeal for the supremacy of the law, reviewed most of the evidence submitted during the trial, extolled the actions of the different members of the Mankin family, denied reliability of some testimony given by the defendant, etc. The address occupied about 2-hours time and was a fine piece of oratory, notwithstanding the fact that attorneys for the defense took exceptions to certain parts thereof. The address was followed by an able and impartial charge to the jury by Judge Hanna. The instructions were lengthy and covered a variety of points such as the definitions of murder and manslaughter the law of self defense, what constitutes a reasonable doubt, rules for reconciling conflicting evidence, determining the credibility of witnesses, etc. The delivery of the charge occupied about 30 minutes, after which the jury retired at 11:45 and as we go to press, is still out.
