CIRCUIT COURT

Norval Walsworth on Trial for Killing James Mankin Dec. 28, 1907—Much Difficulty in Securing a Jury.

The case of State of Oregon vs. Norval Walsworth set for trial in the Circuit Court was called at 10 o'clock Monday morning, the forenoon and part of the afternoon session was occupied in empanelling a jury. A special venire for 12 jurors returnable at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning was given to the sheriff who was directed to go outside of the towns in order to find men who were not disqualified by reason of reading the published reports of former trials and comments thereon.

Recess taken until 9 A. M. Tuesday. The work of selecting jury was resumed Tuesday morning and continued until half past two o'clock at which time the jury box was filled and jurors sworn. Counsel for the state then addressed the jury, stating in detail what the state proposed to prove in regard to the killing of James F. Mankin. Mr. Smith for the defense stated that defense was prepared to prove that defendant was not an aggressor or participant in the encounter between Chas. H. Walsworth and the Mankins and that he was acting in self defense when the fatal shot was fired.

Counsel for the state asked that the jurors be taken to the scene of the tragedy in order to become familiar with the location of the different buildings to be referred to in the evidence given during the progress of the trial. Defendant's counsel joined in the request and the court then directed that jurors in charge of the balliffs be taken in carriages to the Mankin farm and returned to the courtroom at nine o'clock Wednesday morning.

Wednesday morning trial was resumed and examination of witnesses for the state was begun. As most of these were persons who testified at the trial of Charles H. Walsworth last week, the evidence was practically the same as given in that trial. State rested about 4 o'clock and witnesses for defense were called with a few exceptions were the same who appeared last week, D. H. Jackson of Medford being a new witness gave some testimony which may have an important bearing upon the decision of the jury. Mr. Jackson was sheriff of the county at the time of the tragedy and in his official capacity visited the scene of the shooting on the morning following the fracas, made examination of the premises, interrogated several eye witnesses of the shooting, among them being Henry Mankin, Floyd Dyer and Bert Illingsworth. The witness testified as to a statement in regard to shooting, made by these parties, also to shot marks and bullet holes in wood. When questioned in regard to language used and conduct of defendant while in jail, Mr. Jackson stated that defendant never used an improper or profane word and conduct was that of a perfect gentleman.

The taking of testimony was concluded Thursday afternoon when Mr. Reames presented in a forcible manner a short resume of the case, laying particular stress on the manner in which some of the witnesses for the defense had given their testimony. He was followed by Mr. Kelley who ably reviewed the evidence and in a masterly manner pointed out alleged inconsistencies and "remarkable coincidences."

Friday morning Mr. Smith closed the case for the defense, dissecting the evidence bit by bit and presenting strong and logical arguments to show why certain testimony should be rejected. The address occupied almost two hours and although the speaker does not possess a strong and powerful voice the address was delivered in an earnest and convincing manner, and was received with profound attention by the large audience.

Mr. Mulkey began the closing address for the state at 11:30 and as we go to press is still occupying the floor.
