#### A FALSE PROPHECY

The following account of a purported interview appeared in the Portland Journal of Tuesday, under the caption "The Stranger Within Our Gates:"

"D. A. Beldive, Jacksonville, Or.— Jacksonville is gradually dying. Medford is too progressive for the old town and her people are moving to the hub of Rogue River valley. Another 10 years will see the weeds growing in Jacksonville's streets and if there are any residents left it will be because of old time's sake."

The "stranger" looking "through a glass darkly" sees things as perhaps he wishes them to appear but not as they will be. The next ten years will see this city one of the foremost residence towns in the valley, filled with happy, prosperous and contented people; in fact we expect to see many of the present residents of Medford buy lots, erect buildings and establish homes in this city. #### POPULAR ELECTION OF U.S. SENATORS FAVORED

Senator Jonathan Bourne is one of those who favor the popular election not only of United States senators, but the direct nomination of candidates for president and vice president. In support of this he says: "The people of the United States will never have full control of their national government until they nominate their candidate for president and vice president as directly and effectively as the voters of the great parties in Oregon nominate their candidate for governor, senator and other offices." Senator Bourne and other members of the direct primary league will draw up a petition to be circulated among the voters next year, providing for not only the direct nomination of the chief candidates, but allowing the people the privilege of electing the delegates to the various national conventions.—Ex.
