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BURGLAR
AT WORK

Store of Dr. Robinson Entered by Burglar--Gain Entrance by Back Door--Secure \$50 and Make Get-away.

Early Monday morning the report was circulated that a burglary had been committed during the night and that the cash register of one of our merchants had been relieved of its contents.

Further inquiry elicited the fact that the City Drug Store, owned and conducted by Dr. J. W. Robinson had been entered and robbed of about fifty dollars in cash. Entrance was gained through the back door, a glass in which was broken affording the burglar an opportunity to reach in and shoot the bolt with which the door was secured. A lot of small silver in the register, and a purse containing about \$45. were taken, but so far as the proprietor can discover nothing else was disturbed.

No suspicion rests upon any one, but the fact that the purse containing the money was so readily found seems to indicate that the thief knew of its existence and about where it was deposited.

When the clerk entered to open the store Monday morning, he found the back door ajar, but the burglar had departed, leaving no clue to his identity.

QUARTZ

A New Strike Made Near This City--Depth is Required to Make a Mine.

The following article from the Record of Dec. 22, will be of interest to many of our readers, especially as the strike referred to was made about 1 1/2 miles west of this place. The article is as follows:

F. G. McWilliams returned Saturday from making an examination of a rich strike made on the mining properties of the Gold Standard Mining company, situated about 17 miles northwest of Ashland. The new strike was made in about the center of the group of mining claims, 500 feet from the old workings. At a vertical depth of 25 feet a vein of partly decomposed brownish quartz 7 1/2 feet in width was uncovered; the entire width of this vein between the two well defined walls pans free gold to the extent that it is estimated that the quartz contains values of over \$100 to the ton. Paralleling the 7 1/2 foot vein, at a distance of about 80 feet is another, but smaller vein, from 8 to 18 inches in width, of the same nature of quartz, which contains much higher values. Many pan tests made, show fine and "pin-head" gold in quantity. The rich discovery was made by W.

H. Clements, who has had considerable experience in the mines of Colorado and Montana, and who is overseeing the developing work being conducted on the Gold Standard properties.

The Opp mine which is under active operation, is in the same locality, also a number of other properties. This new rich strike has put new life into the camp. If mining was conducted hereabouts in the same manner as it is in Nevada, Montana and Colorado, Southern Oregon would soon be among the front ranks as a big producing mining section. What is required is depth. A vast number of rich strikes have been and are being made near the surface, and as a result the rich ore is gouged out in a haphazard manner and no further development in depth is undertaken, so that Southern Oregon has got the name of being a "pocket" country, but no one has proven that to be a fact, for there is not a deep mining shaft in the entire scope of country. The same was said of the Transvaal and the Goldfield, Nevada, countries, until some men of horse sense, knowing that the riches of the earth did not come from above, so naturally must have come from below, and the nerve to spend a few dollars that had been taken from near the surface to delve into the bowels of the earth by sinking deep shafts, and, as is known, they were rewarded beyond their most sanguine expectations. So it will be some day in Southern Oregon.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS.

Interesting Session Held Tuesday Evening--New Member Sworn in--Water System Discussed.

A special meeting of the city council was held Tuesday evening. Present: Britt, Dunford, Fick and Shaw; Recorder Dox.

Mr. W. T. Grieves who had been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Geo. L. Davis, being present, took the oath of office as member of the council.

The matter of the charges filed against the marshal was discussed and dismissed.

Engineer Osgood was present and discussed the water project in a very encouraging manner, stating that so far as his investigations had proceeded the outlook for a gravity system was excellent. The impression conveyed was that such a system is entirely practical under the existing conditions. The members of the council seemed very enthusiastic on the subject and it is expected that the matter will now be pushed to an early completion.

After the informal discussion of several other matters, council adjourned.

SHOT DOWN.

Harvey Crump Shot in Head at Grants Pass--Assailant Unknown.

Grants Pass Jan. 10.--Harvey Crump 25 years old, was shot through the right temple Sunday night by an unknown man with a revolver. Crump is in the Southern Pacific Hospital. He says he was walking along the street when a man stepped from behind a post at the side of the walk and shot him at close range, his face and hair being powder burned. The ball entered the right temple and lodged near the eye in the bony structure of the skull.

About an hour after he had been shot Crump regained consciousness and made his way to the home of Joseph Roach. Roach took Crump to the Southern Pacific Hospital. He may recover.

Robbery is said to have been the motive. Crump had \$102. on his person when shot. Afterwards his empty purse was found with a few loose coins. The revolver with which Crump was shot was found near by.

Crump is a young man of good character. Intense feeling exists here. No clue to the criminal has been obtained. Numerous rumors have been circulated in regard to the affair. One is that the injured man knows who did the shooting, but will not divulge the name.
