THE PINCHOT AFFAIR.

Whether the President was justified in discharging Forester Pinchot or not will have little effect on the minds of the people in deciding the merits of the Pinchot-Balinger controversy.

The majority of people do not understand legal technicalities and do not care to go into that phase of the matter at all, but one thing they do know and can understand and that is the fact that Pinchot has advocated and labored for the conservation to the people and for the people, of the natural resources of the country, worth many millions of dollars, while his opponents have as diligently striven and planned in the interests of the monopolies and trusts.

The people have long since made up their minds as to the moral status of the man who labors unselfishly for the interests of the country, as against those moved by greed, who work in and for the benefit of the corporations.

Right or wrong in the utterance of the matter for which his head was chopped off, the country will stand by Pinchot for the work he has done.

During the past ten days we have had several inquiries as to whether Barnums were going to extend the railroad to the Applegate valley or not, to all of which the answer has been invariably, "we do not know." So far as we have been able to learn, no definite arrangements have been as yet made for the extension of the road, although rumors to that effect have been in circulation for the past month. We do not care to publish rumors, unless based upon facts, for the reason that they are often intended to mislead and do more harm than good. We would be glad to learn of the projected extension of the R. R. V. Ry. and when assured of the fact will gladly give it all the publicity possible.

In regard to the railroad situation, there is good reasons for the belief that actual work will be done this summer, on a road to the coast by way of the Applegate, but whether an extension of the R. R. V. Ry. or an entirely new project, we are at present unable to say.

Hanna Resigns.

Word was received here Thursday that Judge Hanna had resigned his position as Judge of the First Judicial District and that Frank M. Calkins of Ashland had been appointed to fill the vacancy. The report was a surprise to most people, although a few intimate friends were aware of the intention.

Judge Hanna was appointed in 1872 to fill a vacancy on the bench, and with the exception of one term was

occupied it continuously ever since. His record is that of an upright, honest and fearless Judge. His rulings and decisions have been ever for the right as he saw it, and without fear or favor of any one. The resignation takes effect Feb. 1st.

Miss Margaret Francis died at home of her sister Mrs. Nellie Morcom, in Jacksonville, Friday evening, Dec. 24th 1909, aged 10 years 8 months and 10 days. Pneumonia was the cause of death. She was the daughter of Richard and Georgia Francis, of Granite, Montana, and was born in the town of Granite, Montana, April 14th, 1899.

Mrs. Francis came here about six weeks ago from Montana for the benefit of her health and was accompanied by her two daughters and one son.

Margaret became an enrolled scholar of the Jacksonville public school, and was also a member of the Methodist Sabbath school. A few weeks ago, Dec. 23rd, the scholars of the public schools had public speaking exercises, and little Margaret, though somewhat hoarse, was ready and desired to perform her part which was acceptable to her teacher. But her hoarseness proved to be a bad cold which she had contracted and which was apparently of a more serious nature than the most scrutinizing had thought.
