RUSHING WORK.
Stevens Tells of Rapid Progress of Oregon Trunk.
In the opinion of John F. Stevens president of the Oregon Trunk railway the construction work which is being done on that line in many respects the most remarkable in the history of western railroad building. The progress and character of the work is described in the following statement written by Mr. Stevens for the Journal:
"Construction of the Oregon Trunk railway is proceeding rapidly, and a force of 5000 men is now at work between Cello and Madras, a distance of 109 miles. Most of the heavy cuttings and tunnels are opened up, and all the work under contract to Porter Brothers is under way. It is of such a nature as to require an immense amount of plant, an idea of which can be gained from the fact that there are more than 50 miles of railway employed in the hauling of material from the cuts into the fills.
The building of culverts and bridges is keeping pace with the grading. It is not behind the construction of any similar piece of work undertaken in the west. On this 109 miles are probably nearly as many men as ever were employed on the construction of the 370 miles of the North Bank road. Bids are now being taken on the masonry of the big Columbia river bridge and as soon as the work can be let and right of way matters adjusted, the construction of the immense structure will be pushed with the same vigor which characterizes the rest of this enter prise.—Journal.

SUES WATER COMPANY.
Salem Man Says Impure Water Caused Wife's Death.
James E. Dorrance of Salem began action Monday in the circuit court for Marion county against the Salem Water company to recover \$7500 damages for the loss of his wife, Della R. Dorrance, who, it is alleged, through the negligence of the water company, contracted typhoid fever and died November 15 last year. Mr. Dorrance brought action as administrator of his wife's estate. The amount sued for is the limit that can be recovered under the Oregon statutes for death caused by negligence.
The complaint sets forth that the water company was grossly negligent in furnishing impure water for its users in Salem.

AIR CRUISER.
German Inventor Building Air Ship to Carry Passengers.
Anton Border, a German engineer is building an immense air ship to carry fifty passengers and intended to travel 50 miles an hour. It is an entirely new feature in the construction of aerial craft, as it is built almost entirely of iron and the entire weight of the framework, motors and equipment is 30 tons.
The ship will have five motors with a combined horsepower of 480.
It will be named "Trier" after the town in which it is being built, and will be launched early this spring.

THE FIRST CLOCKS.
One at Padua That Was a Wonder of Mechanism.
It was, we are told, in 1300 that the first clock known to the world was placed in the tower of San Eustorgio, in Milan.
The greatest astonishment and admiration were manifested by crowds who flocked to see the timepiece. In 1344 a clock was installed in the palace of the nobles at Padua. This was a wonder of mechanism indeed, for besides indicating the hours it showed the course of the sun, the revolutions of the planets, the various phases of the moon, the months and the fetes of the year.
The period of the evolution from the clock to the watch was seventy-one years—not so very long, all things considered—and the record of the first watch is 1380. A half century later an alarm clock made its appearance. This, we are told, was looked upon by the people of that age as "un instrument prodigieux."
The fortunate possessor of this clock was Andrea Alciato, a councillor of Milan. The chronicles have placed on record that this clock sounded a bell at a stated hour, and at the same time a little wax candle was lighted automatically. How this was done we are not told, but it must not be overlooked that until about seventy years ago we had no means of obtaining a light other than the tinder box, so that the Milanese must have been centuries ahead of us in this respect.
Not much progress was made with the watch until 1740, when the second hand was added.—London Globe.

TEMPTED, HE ATE.
A Story of Heinrich Heine and a Toothsome Lyons Sausage.
Returning from a journey to the south of France, Heinrich Heine met a friend, a German violinist, in Lyons who gave him a large sausage that had been made in Lyons with the request to deliver it to a mutual acquaintance, a homeopathic physician, in Paris. Heine promised to attend to the commission and intrusted the delicacy to the care of his wife, who was traveling with him. But as the postchaise was very slow and he soon became very hungry, on the advice of his wife both tasted of the sausage, which dwindled with every mile.
