

### TOO MUCH BOOZE

#### Four Students of O. A. C. Suspended for Using Liquor.

Because they were found guilty of violating the college regulation prohibiting the use of intoxicating liquors, four students have been suspended from the Oregon Agricultural College for one year, four others have confessed and apologized before the faculty and student body, and four more are still under investigation.

President Kerr and the faculty expressed themselves as being determined to protect both the students and the institution.

There are no saloons in the city and the investigation which has been carried on seems to indicate that there have been very few instances in which students have been guilty of using intoxicating liquors in the past. The faculty will attempt to put an end to all such practices in the future.
