

MANY MEASURES.

To be Decided at the Polls by the Voters of Oregon.

It is now definitely known that at least 16 measures will be submitted to the voters of Oregon at the coming election, under the initiative and referendum, among which are:

An amendment of section 1, of article 9, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, directing a uniform rule of taxation.

An amendment of article 9 of the Constitution, authorizing the creation of rail road districts and the purchase and construction of railroads, or other highways, by the state, counties, municipalities and railroad districts.

An amendment of sections 6 and 7 article 4, of the Constitution, to provide a separate district for the election of State Senator and each State Representative.

Measures submitted by the Legislature are:

An act authorizing the purchase of a site and the construction and maintenance of a branch insane asylum.

An act to elect, on the first Monday in June, 1911, delegates to a constitutional convention, to be held on the second Monday in October, 1911.

A bill for an act to create the County of Nesmith out of a portion of the northern part of Douglas County and the southern part of Lane County.

Women's taxpaying; suffrage amendment, granting to all taxpayers, regardless of sex, the right of suffrage.

Five initiative measures are not yet filed, but are being prepared. They are: Ashland Normal School bill; Weston Normal School bill; Morcom Normal School bill; U'Ren's bill for people's inspectors of Government; Employees Liability bill.

The people's Progressive Government League has proposed five measures as follows: State-wide prohibition; U'Ren's amendment to article IV of the constitution; same for article V; same for article VI; same for article VII.
