Queer Old Australian Tradition About

the Flood. The aboriginal blacks of Australia have a queer tradition about the flood. They say that at one time there was men and women, could not get at it. Curiosities of Superstition. When Silence Is Deadly.



The windows are air-tight, rain proof and dust proof, and by a new method of ventilation, fresh pure air can be circulated through the entire car in four minutes. In cold weather the car is heated by pipes carrying hot water through the
