Live Stock.

The live stock market at Portland for the month of March has been a pleasing one, both in prices and receipts. As compared with March last year, there was an increase of 3607 cattle, 1103 sheep and 382 hogs. In the face of the great shortage prevailing all over the country, this a splendid showing for the Portland market. All previous records for prices were broken, not alone in individual instances of small sales, but in the higher general average prevailing for all classes of live stock. Cattle sold high, sheep and lambs brought big prices, and the hog market that went up in February has shown no sign of a falling stick. More buyers are looking to this market for their supplies and competition in every line is keen. A further glance at comparative receipts may be of interest.

The showing in hogs is remarkable when it is considered that there were 3127 less brought to Portland by packers from Missouri River points in March, 1910, than in March, 1909. Population is increasing so rapidly in the Pacific Northwest that the farmers need have no fear of an over-supply of live stock that is properly prepared for the market.

CIRCUIT COURT

State of Oregon vs. Charles Greenstreet. Indicted by grand jury for larceny. Defendant plead guilty and asked for immediate sentence. Sentenced by court to one year in the state penitentiary, but sentence suspended during good behavior.

H. W. Huntzinger vs. City of Ashland. Action to recover damages. Jury returned verdict for plaintiff in sum of \$575.

In the matter of the claim of C. J. Kenney vs. Wm. Ulrich, as assignee of the estate of T. J. Kenney, an insolvent debtor. Verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$2040.

State of Oregon vs. Louis Highland and W. Swanson. Indictment larceny. Defendants plead guilty and were sentenced to a term of thirty days in the county jail.

State of Oregon vs. J. P. Adkins, S. S. Jolly, and F. M. Wade. Indictment against S. S. Jolly dismissed by order of the court.

Sarah E. Coffee vs. J. E. Coffee. Suit for divorce. Decree by default.

State of Oregon vs. Henry Daly and D. B. Deeter. Taken under advisement by the court. Defendants were afterwards arraigned and plead not guilty. Case set for trial May 9, 1910.

State of Oregon vs. W. D. Moore. Indictment, carrying a concealed weapon. Defendant plead not guilty, and was placed on trial before a jury. During the trial it was shown that this charge was the result of a neighborhood quarrel, that the belt containing the alleged concealed weapon was taken off his person by the defendant in plain view of the by standers and hung upon the fence during the continuance of a public school meeting, and that he afterwards strapped the weapon on his person, still in plain sight and rode away. Verdict of not guilty.

State of Oregon vs. Adolf Schulz. Indictment by the grand jury for embezzlement. Motion of defendant's counsel for demurrer over ruled. Defendant plead not guilty. Case set for trial May 9.

Cochran vs. Cochran. Suit for divorce. Decree by default.

Loretta Perozzi vs. W. O. Johnson. Jury trial. Verdict for plaintiff in the following sums: damages \$234.70; attorney fees \$37.50; costs \$27.

Engineering Notes

A general scheme for constructing a north breakwater to the entrance of the Panama Canal has been approved, and the preparatory work is being done. The breakwater will protect shipping in the harbor at Colon, and will shelter vessels which are making the north entrance to the canal from the violent "northers" which prevail from October to January. There will be two jetties of rock, which will extend from Toro and Manzanillo points until they reach depths of water of 48 and 4s feet, respectively.

The United States army has recently adopted a new type of machine gun which can be carried by one man, while two such guns with a full equipment of stands and ammunition can be packed upon a mule. The new weapon

can be fired from the shoulder. The barrels are carried in duplicate, and can be rapidly changed when they become heated from continuous firing.

In a recent communication to Flight on the relative military value of aeroplanes and airships, Col. Capper of the British army believes that the improved aeroplane will have the dirigible at its mercy. He predicts that the future aeroplane will be able to ascend to heights of 10,000 feet and over, from which it will swoop down and destroy the more slowly moving dirigibles below.

The New Haven railroad has proposed to the city of Boston to enter into the joint construction of a tunnel between the North and South stations in that city. They offer to spend \$16,000,000 on the construction of the tunnel which is to be electrically operated, provided the city will bear the expense of \$10,000,000, which it is estimated will be the cost of the purchase of the necessary land. —Scientific American.
