HUNDRED THOUSAND TO ONE Limit Reached in Rural Justice Near Tacoma.
Tacoma, Wash., April 4.—A new record for a rural justice, has been established by Justice of the Peace Geo. P. Wood of Roy, this county. James Allen, a tramp, was brought to the county jail today bound over to the superior court by Justice Wood under \$1000 bonds to await trial for "injury to a box car." Wood took a small quantity of oiled waste out of a Northern Pacific freight car journal box to start a fire beside the track. The waste was worth not to exceed one cent. Allen was caught beside the fire and haled before the country justice. The \$1000 bonds fixed is about the limit in rural jurisprudence, say the county authorities.

DUAL TELEPHONES. Wasteful and Wrong Says Madison, Wis., Citizens.

"With the power of regulation reserved—the power to forbid and prevent extortion—Madison citizens cordially welcome the telephone monopoly which has been effected in the consolidation of the two competing companies," says the Democrat of Madison, Wis., in the course of an editorial expressing the new attitude towards public utility companies.

"A fair, just, even generous, return upon the capital actually represented in the plants of the two local systems, now united, will be freely conceded as a fundamental right, and also a regular surplus sufficient to assure maintenance of the unified plant in a condition to yield satisfactory service; but beyond this limit there can be no trespass without producing an emphatic, effective protest.

"Operation of a dual system has been wasteful and wrong, and the people of this community have reluctantly paid the bill. Consolidation obviously must entail large economies, and the public is entitled to corresponding benefits."—Public Service, December, 1909.

WALK AROUND WORLD

Man 70 Years Old Will Make Trip on Foot.

Valdez, Alaska, April 1.—James Fish, 70 years old, sailed for Seattle today on the steamer Bertha on a journey to Manchester, England, his birthplace. He will cover the land portion of his trip afoot. He will walk from Seattle down the coast to Santa Cruz, Cal., and there will turn east across the continent to Boston, where he will

take the steamer to Liverpool. After visiting in Manchester he will travel on foot across Europe, visit the Philippine islands and return to Alaska by way of the Pacific. No one in Valdez believes Fish will be able to finish his journey except Fish himself, who looks with scorn upon the inconsiderable records of Edward Payson Weston. Fish has been a resident of Valdez for 10 years, during which time he has never been outside Alaska.
