or whether fully naturalized,
Give state, territory or foreign country where parents were born.
Trade or profession, nature of business or establishment where working.
Whether an employer, worker or working on own account.
Whether out of work April 15, 1910, and number of weeks, if any, out of work in 1909. "Out of work" does not mean vacations or strikes, but inability to find employment.
If over 50 years, whether a survivor of the Union or Confederate army or navy.
Single, married, widowed, or divorced.
If married, whether first, second or subsequent marriage, and how many years of present marriage.
Whether able to speak English; whether able to read or write English or any other language.
Whether white, black, mulatto, Chinese, Japanese or Indian.
If owner of house lived in, whether it is free or mortgaged.
Whether blind in both eyes, or deaf or dumb.

WOMEN

Same information as given by men, except citizenship and civil war statements. Also leave the following:
If married, widowed or divorced woman, give number of children had during lifetime.
Give number of these children living on April 15, 1910.

The Portland Oregonian is still hammering away at the direct primary law under the guise of its advocacy of the assembly plan, and directly intimating that the voters are not capable of, or not to be trusted in selecting candidates for office unless advised or instructed by a convention or assembly. In our opinion, as we have before stated, the assembly, properly constituted may be beneficial so far as formulating platforms, etc. go, but when it undertakes to advise or dictate who shall or shall not be nominated it is usurping a right which belongs to the voters alone. The primary law may be defective in some particulars, and if so, it should and doubtless will, be amended, but even with these defects it is a great step in advance of the old "ring rule," or convention system—a sort of declaration of independence by the voters of Oregon. The primary has come to stay and every effort to substitute convention rule or assembly plan therefor will meet with the opposition of the intelligent voters.

The county court has decided to macadamize that part of the main county road lying between the city limits of this city and Medford.

The road will be graded and a foundation of broken rock placed thereon which in turn will be covered with crushed rock broken finely and rolled down with a heavy roller, thus forming a hard, smooth surface. We did not learn whether the plans include a coating of asphaltum or other cement, but hope that they do. It will now be up to our city council to repair that portion of the road lying within the city limits, it is stated that the matter has been taken up and that work will be begun at an early date.

The county board are to be commended for their action in this matter and the road when completed will be used and appreciated by hundreds of people.
