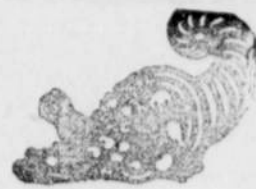

PORTLAND LETTER

Business Men's Excursion

April 25--Largest Colonial Travel in History of the State--Fruit Crop of 1910 Will be Record Breaker.

Portland, Or., April 21-(Special)-It's a long time since Portland business men were so thoroughly enthused as they are now over the great Business Men's Excursion which will leave Portland Monday evening, April 25th, with a schedule that is so arranged that every single point on the trip will be visited in daylight--and thirty points are visited.

Both the East and West sides of the Willamette Valley, the Rogue River Valley, Klamath Falls and the surrounding country, and the Umpqua Valley are included, and all the big jumps that consume time are travelled in the night.

Seventy-five representative business men compose the party, and as a result of this four days spent in Western and Southern Oregon they will get a better idea of the universal prosperity and advancement of these communities than they could gain in a year from their offices.

The development of both the Columbia and Willamette Rivers has been the topic of important meetings during the past week--one at Pasco, the other at Albany--and both had splendid attendance.

A number of prominent citizens of Oregon have received invitations, through Hon. John Barrett, Director of the Bureau of American Republics, to be present at the dedication of the new building at the nation's capital April 26th. One of the most beautiful rooms in this attractive building is finished throughout with Oregon fir, the mill work made right in Oregon from special design and furnished by the Oregon & Washington Lumber Manufacturers Association. Distinguished personages to speak at the dedicatory exercises are President Taft, the Secretary of State, Ambassador of Mexico, Senator Elihu Root and Mr. Andrew Carnegie.

For the last three years Oregon has been chief among the states in attracting Western immigration, and while it is too early for comprehensive figures on this year's colonial travel it is already certain that the total will

be the biggest yet. Trains have been running in from two to four sections to accommodate the travel, and owing to the active work of the Oregon Development League in furnishing advance information through the commercial bodies in dozens of Oregon communities, these newcomers have their minds definitely made up as to location, and buy their tickets to that point.

Oregon never got an advertisement so wide-reaching or so striking as a full page advertisement, with Portland as the Central feature, which appeared last Sunday in the New York World, Indianapolis Star, Chicago Record-Herald, Chicago Tribune, Minneapolis Tribune, St. Louis Globe-Democrat, Kansas City Star and Omaha Bee.

Universal elation is felt over the assurance of horticultural experts that the fruit crop of Oregon will break all records in 1910.

DEATH IN RUNAWAY

Mrs. Byrum Thrown From Carriage and Instantly Killed. Mrs. Garrison Injured.

Mrs. W. R. Byrum was instantly killed and Mrs. Garrison severely injured in a runaway accident near the Table Rock schoolhouse Monday afternoon.

The two ladies had started to drive to Medford. One of the tugs broke and the team, a rather fractious pair, ran away. Mrs. Byrum who had a young child in her arms, leaped from the vehicle when she saw the team was beyond control, and was thrown against the fence bordering the road with such force that she was instantly killed. The babe escaped with just a few scratches.

Mrs. Garrison stayed in the rig until it was overturned, when she was thrown out, suffering a fractured ankle, and other minor injuries. It was first reported that she had been fatally injured, but she is now resting easily and will recover.

The unfortunate victim of the accident, Mrs. Byrum was a daughter of Mrs. A. B. Saltmarsh of Applegate, and was well known to most of the residents of this city and the surrounding country.

She leaves a husband and three small children to mourn her untimely death.

Medford Baptists Purchase New Site for Church.

At a special business meeting of the members of the local Baptist church held Thursday evening in the First Baptist church it was decided to buy the property, known as the Sarah Woods property, located on the corner of Twelfth street and South Central avenue. This property is 100x108 and has a cottage on it which will for the time being be used for a parsonage. The present church home on Fifth street and North Central avenue will be put on the market for sale, and when disposed of it is planned to erect a large and modern church building on the location just purchased.

OCCUPATION IS GONE

Government Makes Ruling Regarding Imported Goods.

The treasury department has made a ruling that only \$10 worth of dutiable goods may be brought into the United States by persons who make frequent trips across the borders into foreign countries.

Heretofore the government allowed each person to bring \$100 worth into the country without payment of duty. The ruling was made following a report by customs officials that persons living along the borders of Mexico and Canada and have been engaged in a profitable business of bringing in woollens and other high tariff goods, under the "exception clause."

Federal officials expect that the new ruling will break up several large coteries of traders who have been working out of Seattle, Bellingham, San Diego, El Paso and Detroit, with other border cities.

It is said that a number of importers have a regular staff employed whose business is it to travel to and fro across the line and bring in goods. This gave such business houses an immense advantage in competition with other firms who did not employ "traders."

DEFINES SISKIYOU

AGAIN SUSTAINED

Supreme Court Says Judge Hanna's Decision Was Just--Says Term Held by Coke was Without Authority.

Judgment of condemnation procured against the property of M. F. Hanley by the city of Medford for the purpose of laying a pipeline across his farm on Little Butte creek, which was obtained in a special session of the circuit court, presided over by Judge J. S. Coke, was declared void by the supreme court in an opinion written by Associate Justice Slater and the restraining order made by Judge H. K. Hanna enjoining the city from proceeding with its pipeline is affirmed.

The opinion holds that the act authorizing the appointment of J. S. Coke and conferring upon him authority to hold court in another district when authorized by the governor, did not confer the power to call a special term of court to hear this special case.

The decision of the supreme court sustains the action of Judge Hanna in the matter as follows:

"As the entrance of the city upon the premises of M. F. Hanley would be of irreparable injury to his property and as the said void judgment, is a cloud upon the title to his premises, this court of equity will interfere to set aside such judgement and Judge Hanna's action in enjoining the city from proceeding further to complete its water system was just and his decree is affirmed."
