Oregon Sidelights.

Astoria lumber mills have more orders than they can fill.

Many more laborers are wanted in western Umatilla county.

New homes are springing up everywhere upon the Umatilla and the Farnish-Coe projects, says an E. O. correspondent.

Settlers are fast clearing away the sagebrush, leveling the ground and planting orchards or seeding to rye and alfalfa.

Local demand in the Rogue river valley now exceeds the supply and cattle are being shipped into the valley, which for years exported them.

The Eugene Register remarks: If Seattle will squeeze the water out of its padded population it will readily understand why Portland really commands better prices and is worth more money.

That the Coquille river is becoming a greater shipping port all the time is evidenced from the number of boats that are arriving and departing says the Bandon Recorder. One day seven vessels were there.

The Southern Pacific has awakened to the fact that there is opportunity for a railroad to Crescent City—but probably the awakening will come too late, as it did with the P. & E., says the Medford Mail-Tribune.

That there are many salmon in the river is known but it is not supposed to be known, says the Astoria Budget. Somewhere in the Prairie channel or some other channel a man puts out a net for a couple of hours during the night, and has never failed to catch at least half a dozen fish. He does not attempt to dispose of them, but what he and his neighbors cannot use is

salted down.

This spring has been very favorable to crops in the Willamette valley, observes the Salem Journal. The spring has come on slowly and yet without frost and the grass, grain and fruit crops were never in better condition at the beginning of spring. They have not made as much growth above ground as below but with the present favorable start and the usual valley weather, there will be great crops in store.

Gold Beach Globe: A wonderfully rich deposit of placer gold has lately been discovered on Chetco river in Curry county. Gold nuggets as large as ordinary pants buttons are found. The gold is found in a deep deposit of blue gravel which prospects one dollar per yard. This deposit is thought to be on the "Blue Lead" channel, which has been struck in many different places, all of which have proven immensely rich.

The hard pull required to raise the subsidy for the College hill street-railway line has shown a condition that exists in practically every growing, progressive community, says the Eugene Guard. Some men who will be greatly benefited have given little or nothing, while others have pledged more than their share in order to insure the success of the movement. CRAWFORD IN KILTS.

The Novelist's Remark When He Saw Himself as a Child.

One of the best known guides in the capitol at Washington used to be Colonel Jasper E. Snow, formerly a Kansas City lawyer, who always sat in Republican conventions and voted for Blaine as long as there was a Blaine to vote for.

Colonel Snow used to tell this little story of the late Marion Crawford.

He had met Mr. Crawford in Florence, Italy, and when the novelist came to Washington Colonel Snow was the first person who showed him the doors made by the novelist's father, Thomas Crawford.

These are the senate bronze doors on the eastern portico. They represent scenes connected with the Revolution and the founding of the government.

The panel representing Washington's reception at Trenton when on his way to his inauguration in New York contains among the populace portrait figures of the sculptor, his wife, his three children and Randolph Rogers, the sculptor of the main doors of the capitol.

The novelist, who had never seen the doors before, quickly identified his mother and father.

"Yes," said he, "mother used to wear her hair just like that."

Then, gazing at the largest child, a faintly familiar figure in kilt, with long, flowing hair, he added speculatively: "But I wonder if I ever really did look like that."—New York Sun.
