CONTRACT LET.

For 125 Miles of Road in Central Oregon.

James J. Hill's second big stride in his invasion of Central Oregon came Wednesday with the letting of a contract for 125 miles of new railroad. H. C. Henry of Seattle, wins the big plum at a bid supposed to be somewhere around \$4,000,000, though the officials of the Oregon Trunk declare the terms of the various bids received are private. The successful contractor is prepared to begin grading for the extension, which will run from Madras to the northern boundary of the Klamath Indian Reservation, at once. The road is to be completed by January 1, 1911, and several thousand men will be put to work just as soon as they can be secured from the labor markets of the Coast, or from the East.

Contractor Henry is the man who established the record for rapid railroad construction in pushing the Pacific Coast extension of the Milwaukee system through from Butte, Mont., to Puget Sound, 1500 miles, in three years. Henry's local representatives say that if they are successful in getting the number of men they want they will make another new record in building this second link in the Oregon Trunk.

The contract awarded today is for a greater mileage than that of the first section, which Porter Bros. are now building from the mouth of the Deschutes River to Madras, a distance of 109 miles. The construction of the line from Madras south to the reservation is not fraught with nearly so many engineering difficulties as the initial link has been, for the road will span a broad open tableland as soon as it emerges from the Deschutes Canyon. There will be no heavy fills or deep cuts, no expensive bridges or mountainous detours and no serious grades to climb, so that construction will be comparatively rapid.

HUGHES SUCCEEDS BREWER.

Governor of New York Appointed Justice of Supreme Court.

Governor Charles E. Hughes of New York, who on April 22, was tendered the appointment to the Supreme bench to succeed the late Justice Brewer, has accepted the appointment, in a letter dated Monday April 25.

As the supreme court will not convene until Oct. 2, it is likely that Governor Hughes will continue to discharge his duties as governor until his qualification on the day of the opening of the court in October.

Garfield on Water Power.

Former Secretary of the Interior Garfield, a man faithfully devoted to the Roosevelt policies, particularly to the Roosevelt conservation policy, a man whose official experience should make him capable of judging the water power situation correctly, said in a speech in Denver Monday evening: "It is certain that an intolerable water monopoly will be fastened upon our people unless the public in both nation and state asserts its authority and controls the use of water. The use of water for the development, of power for storage, and for irrigation, means of necessity exclusive use in certain places, and this use is readily turned into oppressive monopoly unless regulated by government. It is not enough to deny a water trust exists today. All elements which go to make up such a

trust are in existence, and tendency toward such centralization grows stronger day by day."

Roosevelt and Pinchot saw this years ago. Many other men of keen observation see and assert it. And what they assert is not unreasonable or improbable; on the contrary it is exactly in accordance with the trend of the times, and what was to have been expected, certain indeed to happen.

The debatable question is whether the federal government or the state governments or both, jointly, should control. In interstate streams, at least, federal control would seem necessary, for the constitutions and laws of two joining states might not be alike, or harmonious. Whether congress or state legislatures can be more safely trusted to guard the people's interests against monopoly is a question to which there is no sure answer. Governor Shafroth thinks a legislature is more trustworthy than congress, but one has only to glance at the record of several Colorado legislatures to doubt this. One of them elected Guggenheim senator for boodle. Others have proved themselves equally and utterly corrupt. In many states the record is not much better. And there are signs of improvement for the future in congress.
