"STRAWBERRIES ARE RIPE"
Sang the Birds in Jacksonville April 26th.

On Tuesday, April 26, ripe strawberries were gathered in the garden of Mr. S. P. DeRoabom of this city, and in fact we heard of a few that were gathered last week but did not mention the fact as we were not sure as to the name of the grower. The berries grown by Mr. DeRoabom are not "hot house" fruit, but were picked from plants grown in the open air, without protection of any kind except our excellent climate.

Vetch in Oregon.

(By Dr. JAS. WHITCOMBE.) This forage plant finds an exceptionally congenial home West of the Cascades. It is valuable either for hay, silage, pasture or for soiling. All classes of stock are exceedingly fond of vetch. It is about equal to alfalfa in food value but consumed with less waste. Sown early in the fall at the rate of about sixty pounds per acre with one bushel of winter oats or wheat it should yield from three to four tons of hay per acre. For cattle a mixture of oats and vetch is desirable; for horses, wheat and vetch are better.

Vetch is a legume, hence a soil builder. It is hardy and easily grown. Vetch drilled in on a thoroughly disced spring sown stubble will produce a good crop. There is nothing better for winter cover crop than vetch. Vetch should be cut for hay when the first pods are formed and the seed begins to develop, for cattle. This same stage of ripeness is about right

also for silage; for horses, it should be cut later or about the time the first seeds are about half developed.

Vetch is one of the best hays grown for the dairy herd and should receive attention from dairymen. If grown on old grain land fifty pounds of land plaster per acre, sown about April 1st, will often double the crop.

The local banks have received a letter from State Bank Examiner Steel in regard to overdrafts, urging that bankers discontinue the honoring of same. Mr. Steel calls special attention to the law in regard to the matter, and advises that the practice must be stopped.

Barnum at Portland.

The following article concerning our townsman Mr. W. H. Barnum appeared in the Portland Journal April 21. We omit the Journal's head lines:

"W. H. Barnum, accompanied by Mrs. Barnum, of Jacksonville, is spending a few days in the city. There is probably no other man in the United States that holds as many responsible positions in railroad circles as Mr. Barnum. But the good people of Jacksonville go right along, paying no attention to his greatness. They are used to it. He is the president, General manager, master mechanic, superintendent, train dispatcher, engineer, fireman and section boss of the Rogue River Valley Railroad company. His son, John, is secretary, and another son, William, is treasurer.

The Rogue River Valley railroad runs from Medford to Jacksonville, a distance of five miles. The train makes six trips to and from Medford daily, and consists of a coach, sometimes two, and an engine.

Barnum has never yet acted as conductor. John does that. John is conductor, brakeman, switchman, and straw boss on the section. One time, Jacksonville people say, the elder

Barnum was gone, and John essayed to handle the entire service. So he ran the train down the track about half way to Medford, stopped her and then went back and collected fares. Two young, obstreperous and wicked fellows got off and refused to pay just then, and John had to go back to his engine and haul them free of charge. He couldn't be in two places at once, after all.

William, the treasurer of the road, is a king in his own right. He has charge of the evening service. Nifty thing, that evening service. It consists of a motor car that will in a pinch, hold eight people. It runs by gasoline power—unless it burns out a sparking plug, or a dewdad, or whatever it is that happens to motor cars that run on tracks. The nifty part of it is that you pay 50 cents to ride on the motor car. Two bits is the fare one way in the passenger coach in the daytime.

After a while the Rogue River Valley Railroad company will have a full crew, for George is growing up. George is the youngest son. Sometimes George acts as conductor. It is really not such a hard task, after one gets his hand in. But great changes are scheduled for the Rogue River Valley railroad. The company is soon to place in commission a motor car that will accommodate 40 passengers. It was tried out the other day and proved a failure. Something was too light—the dynamo, perhaps. Anyway, Mr. Barnum says, it will be all right when whatever is broke is fixed, and then the engineer will be out of a job. It will give him an opportunity to attend to his other duties."
