**Obituary.**

A cloud of sadness has been spread over our town and community by the death of our esteemed citizen and neighbor, James Young, which occurred at his home in this city Sunday evening, May 1st, after an illness of several weeks. For several days little or no hope had been held out by the attending physicians to the many anxious relatives and friends, and while the end did not come as a surprise, nevertheless, it came as a shock to the community, where Mr. Young had lived for many years, and where he was most highly esteemed.

James Young was born near Kingston, Canada, March 8th, 1855, where he lived until he was about twelve years of age, when the family moved to Balsam Lake, Wisconsin. In the year 1877, when at the age of twenty-two years, he married Miss Alma Loveless. About the year 1886, with his wife and four children he moved west and settled in Southern Oregon, where he resided until his death. In 1889 his wife died, leaving him with six children, Mrs. Clara Shearer, of White Bird, Idaho, Mr. Wm. Young of Fort Jones, California, Miss Elsie Young of Condon, Oregon, and Ada, Leonard, and Charley, who are now deceased.

Thirteen years ago the 4th day of last February Mr. Young was married to Miss Leatha Swartzfager. Five children were born of this marriage, all of whom are living, Stella, Albert, Lorán, Ommer, and Glendail.

Mr. Young became a member of the Methodist church many years ago, and had his membership transferred to the Methodist church in Jacksonville three years ago. He had been a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for twenty-five years, and was also a member of Table Rock Encampment No. 10, I. O. O. F., of Jacksonville, Oregon. In both branches of the order he was noted for his loyalty and fidelity to its teachings. He loved the order and rarely missed a meeting, and always stood ready to help a brother in distress.

James Young was a good man, the highest tribute that can be paid to any man, and he lived among his neighbors without reproach. In his death his wife and children lose a devoted husband and father, but they are not the only ones who suffer loss, for the community loses an esteemed and respected citizen. Sympathy for the bereaved family and relatives is deep and sincere.
