Ashland capitalists file articles of incorporation.

The articles of incorporation of the Citizens Banking and Trust Company of Ashland, went forward to Salem Thursday for filing with the secretary of state, the incorporators being J. A. Harvey, H. F. Portland, C. E. Larkin, L. A. Neil, and H. E. Badger. The capitalization of the new financial concern is fixed at \$50,000, there being, it is announced, some fifty local subscribers who have thus far taken stock, which is to be apportioned in blocks of not to exceed \$2500. It is the purpose of the organizers of the bank to build a new building and options have been secured on a number of different sites on East Main street, the most likely one of which, it is said, is the corner on the south side of the street, adjoining the property of D. K. Mills on the east. The bank which is planned to make a specialty of the trust feature so prominent in latter day banking, will also cater to the commercial business, and expects to be ready for business by September, or sooner, if a building can be completed at an earlier date.—Tidings.

Codling Moth Spray.

The time to spray with arsenate of lead for codling moth in this section is from the 1st to the 10th of May—for the first spraying to catch the first brood of moth. By a thorough drenching of the fruit and foliage with two or two and a half pounds of arsenate to fifty gallons of water, it will not be necessary to apply the second spray until the last of June or the first part of July. The work should be thoroughly done, with the best pressure possible. Use the best brand of lead on the market. If you want to make a combination spray for aphids and moth, add one gallon of black tobacco dip to fifty gallons of the arsenate mixture. Do your work thoroughly if you expect good results.

In using the lime-sulphur spray for peach spot fungus, about the 10th of May, to one gallon of the spray add thirty gallons of water.
