CANDIDATES WILLING

To accept state offices--Thirty initiative petitions listed.

The following extracts from a recent news letter indicate that there will be no dearth of candidates for the various state offices to be filled at the November election.

"To date, 30 initiative petitions from every section of the state are assured. These measures, if adopted, will slice the southern and a part of the eastern section of the state into many pieces, will authorize woman suffrage and create a new normal school.

Among the avowed candidates for Governor are: James Withycombe, of Corvallis, defeated in 1905 for that office by Senator Chamberlain; J. H. Ackerman, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; Jay Bowerman, of Gilliam County, president of the Senate in the last assembly of the Legislature, and Grant Dimick, of Oregon City, who has been making an active campaign throughout the state for some months.

It is rumored here that Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, is aspiring for the Governorship, also William S. Duniway, State Printer. In any event, the voters will have for their consideration at next election, unless some unforeseen changes are made, at least five names to select from for chief executive of the state.

Frank W. Benson, of Roseburg, Governor and Secretary, and will have no opposition unless it be true that J. B. Coffey, of Portland, will make a contest.

A new man for State Treasurer has been receiving notice in Salem in the person of Tom Mahony, of Heppner. Other candidates, including the present incumbent of the Treasurer's office, George A. Steel, are T. C. Taylor, of Umatilla County, and Ralph W. Hoyt, of Multnomah County.

Both Justices King and Slater will be candidates for re-election, and there are six Republicans mentioned. They are: L. T. Harris, of Lane County; C. U. Gantembin, of Multnomah County; George H. Burnett, of Marion County; H. J. Bean, of Umatilla County, and A. M. Crawford, of Roseburg. Justice Eakin has two more years to serve, while Justices McRride and Moore complete their terms. The latter two will seek re-election.

The office of Attorney-General is also being looked forward to by several influential candidates. J. N. Hart, of Baker City, is named; also F. S. Grant, of Multnomah County, and W. H. Wilson, of The Dalles.

It is generally understood in political circles of Salem that W. C. Hawley, of Marion County, and W. R. Ellis, of Umatilla, desire to succeed themselves as Congressmen. B. F. Mulkey, District Attorney of Jackson County, is talked of as an opponent of Hawley, and Congressman Ellis may be opposed by J. F. Logan, of Multnomah County. C. L. McNary, of Marion County, is mentioned as a probable candidate for Congress also.

Labor Commissioner Hoff will be a candidate for re-election, and friends of Fred S. Waters, of Salem, are urgent in the desire that he run, too.

Oswald West, a member of the Railroad Commission, who was appointed to serve four years, will leave his office at the expiration of his term next January, and a new Commissioner will be needed. E. V. Carter, of Ashland, is proposed as a candidate."

Engineering.

The German estimate of aeronautical statistics for the year 1910 is that Germany will have fourteen dirigibles and seven aeroplanes; Russia, three dirigibles and six aeroplanes, and England, two machines of each kind.

The activity in railroad construction in the Northwest is unsuicrable for the construction of several important bridges across the larger rivers. A notable instance of this is the Columbia River bridge on the North Coast Railway in Washington, the permanent sub-structure of which will consist of twelve piers, carrying a superstructure made up of nine Howe truss spans, and a draw span across the main channel.

A leading southern journal speaks words of wisdom when it says that the policy of navy yard construction of battleships should be adhered to, even if it costs a trifle more than building in private yards. Keeping our leading navy yards busy with warship construction not only serves as a stimulus to private contractors, but it has the important effect of maintaining the navy yard forces intact, with a large body of skilled workmen ready at all times to undertake emergency work.

The loss of the Atlantic transport liner "Minnehaha" upon the much-dreaded rocks at the western end of the Scilly Islands reminds us again that, in spite of additional safeguards which have been introduced of late years in trans-Atlantic navigation the perils of the sea are still insistent. The great success of the submarine bell on our Atlantic coast suggests that this device might be used to very good effect at the more dangerous points at the approaches to the British Isles.—Scientific American.
