THE COMET

And Eclipse of Moon Were Both Visible Last Monday Evening.

Although an electric storm raged in the earlier part of the evening, both comet and eclipse were plainly visible through rifts in the clouds shortly after nine o'clock, Monday evening.

Owing to the obscuration of the moon the appearance of the comet was especially fine, the tail being plainly visible in a graceful sweep toward the south.

The total eclipse began about nine o'clock and continued for almost one hour, the disk of the moon appearing in various shades of color owing to the different densities of the passing clouds.

Taken together the spectacle afforded was one well worth seeing, especially when we consider that a similar occurrence is not likely to happen again during the lifetime of any who were present on this occasion.

REBEKAH ASSEMBLY

Interesting Session Held at Eugene Last Week--Officers Elected.

An interesting session of the Rebekah Assembly, I. O. O. F., jurisdiction of Oregon, was held at Eugene last week.

Life Imprisonment for Gohl.

Aberdeen, Wash., May 24.—William Gohl, former agent of the Sailor's Union, convicted of murder in the first degree for killing his sailor friend, Charles Hadberg, was today sentenced by Judge Ben Sheeks in the Superior Court at Montesano, to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla. Gohl took the sentence calmly, telling the court; when asked if he had anything to say for himself, that he had not had a fair trial, and that his time to prepare for the trial had been too short, and that many of his witnesses, brought to testify in his behalf, had not been allowed to enter the court room. An appeal will probably be taken to the State Supreme Court.

Sentence was passed after the Judge had overruled the motion for a new trial, made by attorneys for Gohl. Whether or not an appeal will be taken depends on whether Mrs. Gohl, who is now living in Montesano so as to be near her husband, is able raise the funds required for a further legal fight.

PACIFIC & EASTERN

Grants Pass Editor Thinks Road to Coast Will be Through that Burg.

The Observer in its issue of Wednesday devotes considerable space trying to prove that if Hill builds a road through to the coast it will be by way of Grants Pass, rather than the natural and logical route through Jacksonville.

We quote from one article as follows: "People who do not know the topography of this section of the State, seem to assume that the Hill road is billed to run westward from Medford, but there is ground for reasonable doubt in that regard. The Pacific & Eastern is now constructed to Eagle Point, and a new town has been surveyed two miles from the present site to get better station facilities. There is apparently expected to be considerable train moving at that point. It may be that the route of Hill's coast road is already settled to go by way of Medford, but it may also be that the route is not settled. Let us consider the proposition:

Commencing at Eagle Point, the distance to Medford as the crow flies, and as shown by Rand McNally's last map of Oregon, is 12 miles; Medford to Ruch on the Applegate river, with very heavy grades, the distance is 9 miles; from Ruch to Wilderville, 22 miles. Total distance by this route from Medford to Wilderville, 43 miles.

Now, measure the route by way of Grants Pass. From Eagle Point, via Sam's valley, to Grants Pass, 28 miles; Grants Pass to Wilderville, 6 miles. Total, 34 miles.

This route then, measured in straight lines, is 9 miles shorter than the Medford route. That is something that Hill is certain to consider. Besides, the grade from Grants Pass to Wilderville offers no difficulty whatever, while the grade between Jacksonville and Ruch is very heavy. Hill is likely to consider this, too, and it is altogether contrary to his policy to add unnecessary miles or climb unnecessary grades.

In view of all which, there is a strong presumption, in the absence of any definite knowledge, that Hill's coast road will be constructed by way of Grants Pass, and not by way of Medford. The facts will only be known when definite information is given out by Hill's managers."

EIGHTH GRADE

Examinations Held--70 Out of 116 Applicants Passed.

Out of 116 applicants in the county eighth grade examination held May 12 and 13, 70 passed in all subjects and were awarded diplomas. Many others passed in all but one or two subjects, under the rules governing such examinations, they will be allowed to rewrite upon those subjects at the June examination, and if successful, will be awarded diplomas then. Those who failed in more than two subjects will be required to take the whole examination again.

The highest percentage was made by Miss Hazel Beebe of the Agate school who had an average of 94.8 per cent.

Miss Sylvia Kelley of the Willow Springs school was a close second with 94.5 per cent. Miss Almada Orr of the Agate School and Miss Hazel Rick of the Savage Creek school tied for third place, each having an average of 94.2 per cent.

CALL IS ISSUED

For State Assembly to Meet in Portland July 21.

The Republican state central committee has sent out a call for a state assembly to meet in Portland July 21. "For the purpose of formulating and adopting a party platform, and to recommend to the favorable consideration of the republican voters of the state, the name of a candidate, best qualified, for each of the elective state offices, representatives in congress, and judicial district offices composed of more than one county, subject to nomination at the primary election to be held on September 24, 1910 as provided by law."

The apportionment provides for 1248 delegates, Curry county being allowed five, and Multnomah 354, with the other counties ranging between these extremes, Jackson being allowed 41, and Josephine 19.

The call is published over the names of M. C. George, Chairman, and E. V. Littlefield, Secretary.

NEW SCHEUDLE

Of Motor Car on S.P. is Proving Popular, Says Mail-Tribune.

The new time table for the motor car of the Southern Pacific Company which went into effect Sunday is proving popular with the residents of the Rogue River Valley, if the crowds which utilized it yesterday is any criterion. The car was crowded on each trip each way. The time table in effect at present sends the car south at 8:25 a. m. and at 2:24 p. m. and north at 10:35 a. m. and 4:48 p. m.

New stops have been arranged for Voorhies, Rock Point and Savage Rapids and the crossing at Seven Oaks, near Central Point may become a stop soon for the people residing in that section are petitioning the company to have the motor car stop there. As there are about 100 persons who would be accommodated by the car stopping there the petition will probably be granted.—Mail-Tribune.

Louis W. Hill States Impressions of Recent Trip --Great Northern Will Open up Oregon.

"A wonderful state that will grow anything. I never dreamed that Oregon would grow palms," he resumed. "But it will. I saw them flourishing down the line. It will grow anything from rye and wheat and grasses to figs and tropical fruit.

"My impressions of the trip are so many that they would fill a book, but the one thing above all others is that the Great Northern will assist in doubling the state's population in the next two years. And railroads will be built in every direction. I am not speaking for an east and west line or any other line, because I am not building railroads, but I know they will be built, and there will be more than one. I see room for many roads.

"The Great Northern is going to open up Oregon whether the people want us or not, but I feel that the people are with us. I never met more enthusiasm anywhere than in Oregon. Everywhere we were received and welcomed in a way that bespoke genuine sympathy and deep enthusiasm. To say that the trip was a revelation and a great pleasure is putting it mildly."
