McGuire Sentenced.

(Grant Pass, Oregon, May 24, 1910) James McGuire, found guilty of manslaughter at the April term of court for the killing of Ignaz Knappka in the mountains south of this city last January, was this afternoon sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary. A petition signed by all the jury, and one signed by leading citizens, asked the mercy of the court and McGuire showed much disappointment when the sentence was pronounced by Judge Calkins.
