

### The Vision of War.

The past rises before me like a dream. Again we are in the great struggle for national life. We hear the sounds of preparation the music of hoarse drums the silvery voices of heroic bugles. We see the pale cheeks of women and the flushed faces of men, and in those assemblages we see all the dead whose dust we have covered with flowers. We lose sight of them no more. We are with them when they enlist in the great army of freedom. We see them parting with those they love. Some are walking for the last time in the quiet woody places with the maidens they adore. We hear the whisperings and the sweet words of eternal love as they lingeringly part forever. Others are bending over cradles kissing babes that are asleep. Some are receiving the blessings of old men. Some are parting with mothers who hold them and press them to their heart again and again and say nothing; and some are talking with wives and endeavoring with brave words, to drive from their heart the awful fear. We see them part. We see the wife standing at the door with the babe in her arms—standing in the sunlight sobbing. At the turn of the road a hand waves, she answers by holding high in her loving hands, the child. He is gone forever.

We see them as all proudly march away under flaunting flags, keeping tune to the wild, grand music of war, marching down the streets of the great cities, through the towns and across the prairies to the fields of glory, to do and to die for the eternal right.

We go with them, one and all. We are by their side on all the glory fields, in all hospitals of pain, on all the weary marches. We stand guard with them in the wild storms and under the quiet stars. We are with them in the ravines running with blood, in the furrows of old fields. We are with them between contending host, unable to move, wild with thirst, the life ebbing slowly away among the withered leaves. We see him pierced by balls and torn with shells in the trenches of forts, and in the whirlwind of the charge, where men become iron, with nerves of steel. We are with them in the prisons of hatred and famine, but human speech can never tell what they there endured.

We are at home when the news comes that they are dead. We see the maiden in the shadow of her first sorrow. We see the silvered head of the old man bowed with the last grief. The past rises before us, and we see four millions of human beings governed by the lash. We see them bound hand and foot. We hear the strokes of cruel whips. We see the hounds tracking women through tangled swamps. We see babes sold from the breasts of mothers. Cruelty unpeppable! Outrage infinite!

Four million bodies in chains—four million souls in fetters. All the sacred relations of wife, mother, father, and child trampled beneath the brutal feet of night. And all this was done under our own beautiful banner of the free. The past rises before us. We hear the roar and shriek of the bursting shells. The broken fetters fall. The heroes die. We look. Instead of slaves we see men, women, and children. The wand of progress touches the auction block, the slave pen, the whipping post, and we see homes and frescoes and school-houses and books, and where all was want and crime and cruelty and fear, we see peace of the free.

These heroes are dead. They died for liberty—they died for us. They are at rest. They sleep in the land they made free—under the flag they rendered stainless, under the solemn pines, the sad hemlocks, the tearful weeping willow, and the embracing vines. They sleep, beneath the shadows of the clouds, careless alike of sunshine or of the storm, each in the windowless palace of rest. Earth may run red with other wars—they are at peace. In the midst of battle, in the roar of conflict, they found the serenity of death. I have one sentiment for the soldiers, living and dead—cheers for the living and tears for the dead.

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### Good Roads.

The problem of maintaining good roads, always a most important one in the United States, has recently been rendered of critical urgency by the rapid development of the automobile—the most destructive vehicle to road surface that ever ran on our modern highways. The public resentment or regret, as the case may be, against the destructive effects of automobile traffic should be tempered by the recognition of the fact that it has been the most active instrument in awakening the public to the necessity for abandoning the old slipshod methods of constructing them according to the best engineering practice.

If it were possible to rebuild all our roads of the most approved and highest class of construction, and if the most suitable material were everywhere available, the problem would be greatly simplified, but such uniform excellence is impossible, both because of the cost and of the difficulty of finding the ideal materials within economical hauling distance of the work. In a country of such wide extent and such varied geological formation as the United States, the question of the best kind of roads to build in any locality must be determined largely by the local conditions—the climate, particularly as regards the amount and distribution of the rainfall; the nature of the underlying soil, its bearing quality, capacity for quick drainage, etc., and above all, the character of the materials available for road building, must all enter into the problem.—Scientific American.

### Election Year in Oregon.

Oregon elects state and county officers in November this year, the new law changing the date from June becoming effective in 1910. Under this, new county and other officials whose terms would have expired on July 1st, will get an extra tenure of office of six months.

Registration begins June 7, and all voters must be registered in order to vote.

Arguments for initiative or referendum petitions must be filed with the secretary of state by July 4, and initiative measures must be filed up to July 25. August 1 pamphlets containing initiative and referendum measures must be printed, and distribution of the same ceases September 14.

On September 23 certificates of nomination by political parties or an assembly of electors, must be filed though petitions for nominations of candidates can be filed up to October 8. The following day is the last candidates have to file cuts and arguments for and against nominated candidates with the secretary of state for printing in campaign pamphlets. November 8 is the date of the general election.

August 14 is the latest date on which petitions for nomination can be filed for candidates for nomination by a political party which at the next preceding general election cost 25 per cent of the entire vote for that office. August 22 is the latest date they can file cuts and arguments for and against such candidates for the election pamphlets.—Ex.
