NEW PACE

Set by Curtis—Flies 137 Miles at 54 Miles an Hour.

New York, May 30.—The beginning of aeroplane flights between Chicago and New York, with no more stops than would be necessary for an express train to exchange engines, is considered a probability here. Aviators, enthused by the achievement of Glenn H. Curtiss in flying 137 miles between Albany and New York yesterday with only two descents, are claiming that with the establishment of aerodromes and increased knowledge of aerial conditions, Curtiss' flight may be surpassed for greater distances and that eventually gigantic passenger carrying airships may ply between principal cities of the United States.

Curtiss today was the recipient of many honors and congratulations bestowed by his admirers. More substantial in reward was the New York World's check for \$10,000, the prize Curtiss won by his successful flight. The aviator gave the check to Mrs. Curtiss, who took it with a smile and said she would "make good use of it." Among the records that Curtiss fractured was the world's average hourly speed record for long distance flights. Curtiss maintained an average speed of 54 4/5 miles an hour throughout the journey. He estimated that he ascended to a height of 5000 feet at one time in the flight.

A man who a year and a half ago purchased 12 acres of a place near Central Point, paying \$1500 an acre, or \$18,000, has just sold it to a Mr. Beckworth, an attorney of New York, for \$1833 an acre, or \$22,000. The 12 acres are planted to apples, which are in bearing.

Hood River News: We learn from one of the prominent orchardists in valley, that nature is lending a helping hand in the apple orchards this spring. The are thinning themselves very nicely, saving much labor and expense. The apples remaining on the trees are firm, perfectly shaped and clear of blemish, making the prospects for a fine crop perfect.

Prineville Review: Statistics show the death rate from tuberculosis all over the country to be close to 10 per cent; in Crook county last year there were but 43 deaths from all causes. And this in a county containing close to 8000 souls. A trifle more than one half of one per cent. But one county physician is required to look after the contagious and county cases, with nominal fees, and very little of his time is required for this purpose.

W. W. Masten, six miles south of Klamath Falls, says the Chronicle, has gone into the farming business on the largest scale of any man who ever attempted to till the soil of Klamath county. He has purchased a gasoline engine with which he is doing his plowing. Twelve plows are hitched to this monster engine which cuts a strip 20 feet wide at every round. The engine has a big headlight and is run day and night, and is turning over 50 acres every 24 hours.

"The census takers have been finishing up their job, and now there will be hairpulling," says the Albany Democrat. "Albany this year is about in the boat of Salem ten years ago when it got a population of 4280, due to contracted limits and poor census taking. It immediately enlarged. There is a leakage about Albany that is startling. Accordingly it means a showing about like that of Salem of 1900. Already a hundred misses of one enumerator have been found, just picked up."—Journal.

Aeronautics.

On May 19th M. Scheurt flew from Mourmelon to Chalons, France, a distance of about 30 miles across country. The flight was made in a biplane at a claimed speed of 46 1/2 miles an hour.

Daniel Kinet, a Belgian, flew 2 hours and 51 minutes with a passenger in France on the 15th instant. This flight was also made in a biplane and constitutes a new world's record.

Mr. Clifford B. Harmon has been making some excellent flights of nearly a half hour's duration at Mineola, L. I., in the Farman biplane which he purchased from Paulhan. On the 21st he gained the pilot-aviator license of the Aero Club of America by making a 3-mile flight. He is the first amateur sportsman in America to take up aviation, and is doing a great deal for the cause.

Mr. Moore, of Washington, D. C. who has been Mr. Emile Berliner's assistant for some time past, has constructed a very light monoplane, fitted with a 35-horse-power revolving-cylinder motor. The machine and motor complete weigh but 260 pounds. The motor is placed above and between the wings at the front end of the machine. The cylinders revolve in a horizontal plane, and drive the propeller through bevel gears. Mr. Moore has gotten off the ground a number of times with his monoplane and made several successful short flights.—Scientific American.

Origin of Name Minnesota. Noted antiquarians of St. Paul disagree as to the origin of the name Minnesota. It is claimed by some to be a Dakota word meaning bluish or clouded water. A skillful Chippewa scholar advances the theory that it may be from that tongue. The Chippewas, he says, always name natural objects from some peculiarity connected with them. Thus A-zo-te in that language means the aspen tree. Min-a-zota is applied by them indiscriminately to the Balm of Gilead and the cottonwood tree. The forests of cottonwood abounding in the Minnesota bottoms may have caused them to give the river that name.—St. Paul Pioneer Press.

Old Time London Bank Clerks. Formerly the dress of the ordinary bank clerk was knee breeches, silk stockings, shoes with silver buckles, tall coat and often a white tie. Messrs. Courts drew the line at the clean shave and a frock coat. Hirsute ornaments were regulated by strict orders from headquarters, beards or the mustache not being tolerated for many years. Nearly every one walked to and from business at that time, three, four or five miles being no uncommon distance. One gentleman lived in Friday street, Champs-Élysées. He used to saunter down to the bank about 8:30 in dressing gown and slippers, sign the "appearance book" and then return home to shave and breakfast at his leisure.—London Standard.
