Votes Bonds.

By a good majority, Ashland citizens voted bond issues for street improvements and to complete the electric light plant, Monday.

The street improvement bonds are for \$30,000. and the bonds for the light plant are \$25,000.

The vote was: Street bonds—yes 335, no 150. Light plant—yes 368, no 102. It is evident that they intend to have light whether they have a trolley car or not.

Aeronautics.

The latest and longest two-passenger cross-country flight was made on the 9th instant in France by Lieut. Fagnant and Capt. Marconnet on a Henry Farman biplane. Starting from Chalons at 4:40 A. M., the officers flew 176 kilometers (109 1/4 miles) cross country to the artillery park at Vincennes, which was reached at 7:10. This flight of two and one-half hours' duration was accomplished at a speed of 43 1/2 miles per hour. Capt. Marconnet was able to take photographs and make sketches that would have been of great strategic interest in time of war.

This is the first practical demonstration of the aeroplane for scouting purposes, in addition to its being a new world's record for cross-country flying with two men in the machine. Another French aviator, Labouchere, flew for ten minutes with two passengers at Mourmelon on the same day.

Previous to attempting a long-distance flight from New York to Philadelphia and back, Mr. Hamilton gave some beautiful exhibitions of his skill in flying at Mineola the first week in June. He would rise to a height of from 200 to 300 feet and circle about, at the same time swooping down to within 15 or 20 feet of the ground and suddenly rising again. When he was about to alight he would shut off the motor at a good height, and dive almost perpendicular to the earth. When only 10 or 12 feet from the ground he would level up his machine, and make an extended glide only a few feet above the surface. He appeared to ride in the biplane as easily and with the same skill that a bareback rider rides his horse, and he seemed to take as much enjoyment from his dives and other pranks as did the large number of interested spectators. The machine he has used since last winter is the identical racer used by Mr. Curtiss at Rheims. It is very fast, and has also demonstrated its ability to carry two people, since Mr. Hamilton took aloft a friend for a short spin on the 4th instant.—Scientific American.

ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Insane man jumps through
car window--Climbs pole
to electric light wire.

Monday evening Deputy Sheriff Dow brought from the county hospital an insane man who had twice attempted suicide; once by jumping through a window on a moving train near Ashland, and failing in the attempt to end his life he next tried the electric method, climbing to the top of an electric light pole and seeking to make connection with a live wire.

Owing to the repairs being made at the county jail the unfortunate man was placed in the city bastille pending an examination by the county court.

RUNS L'OWN MAN

Robert Taft, son of president
ran over man at Beverly.

"One of President Taft's automobiles, driven by his son, Robert A. Taft, ran over and seriously injured an Italian street laborer today. At the hospital it was said there were indications that the workman's skull was fractured.

Robert Taft, with two college friends, Lendel King, of Minneapolis, and George Harrison, of Washington, started out from the Summer White House this morning for a spin along the Massachusetts North Shore. Robert, who has been driving the car about the city considerably since his arrival last week, was at the steering wheel.

At Prides Crossing, about two miles from home, the streets were being oiled. The automobile was slowed down. The horn sounded, and most of the men stepped aside. One of them, however, was not quick enough, and the machine struck him, tossing him into the gutter, he was unconscious when picked up by Robert Taft and his friends. The men said that his name was Michael Phisthows.

To appear July 15, says news

"Medford is to have another daily paper, to be known as the Medford Sun, L. C. Branson, from Tonopah, Nev., is to be managing editor, and S. S. Smith, of Eldorado, Kan., business manager. A complete plant is now being installed, and the first number of the new paper is to be out on July 15. It will be a morning paper with "insurgent" Republican and prohibition proclivities, it is reported, and the undertaking has the backing of some of the leading capitalists of Medford and vicinity."

CUTTING AFFRAY

At Medford--Two men lodged in
county jail.

Frank McDonald was bound over to appear before the grand jury Tuesday by Justice Canon on a charge of having assaulted one John Warren with a dangerous weapon, to-wit, a knife.

The ruction occurred in the Horse Shoe Club saloon on Front Street Monday evening, where, it appeared from the testimony, that a free-for-all fight occurred. In the melee Warren was slashed across the side of the face with a knife. McDonald was identified as the man who had wielded the weapon by Arthur Deltz, John Ward and other by-standers, but Warren "didn't know who had cut him." After the cutting the knife mysteriously disappeared and has not been located.

Justice Canon bound McDonald over with bail fixed at \$500, in default of which he was remanded to the charge of the sheriff.

Warren, who was evidently trying to shield his assailant, was also remanded in default of bail. Both men were taken to Jacksonville Tuesday afternoon.—Mail-Tribune.

CALIFORNIA OIL

Output surpasses capacity of
pipe lines.

San Francisco, Cal., June 30.—In the midst of phenomenal prosperity, California petroleum producers now are face to face with a perplexing problem that is causing temporary embarrassment.

The tremendous deposits of petroleum underlying the Golden State have, during the past few months, yielded such an enormous quantity of the precious fluid that the output at the present time surpasses the pipe line facilities for transporting it to market and has taxed producers to the utmost to provide storage facilities to conserve it.

The petroleum production of California for May was simply stupendous. During that month over 7,000,000 barrels of the precious fluid were brought forth from the bowels of the earth, representing a value of more than \$3,500,000.

Until three months ago \$5,000,000

barrels was considered a phenomenal output for a period of 30 or 31 days. But within that time the production has increased by leaps and bounds until now it is over the 7,000,000-barrel mark. If the pace is sustained during the present month, the production for the first six months of 1910 will have been on a basis of 72,000,000 barrels for the year. This is a record that Russia has but a few times exceeded.

Whether the present rate of production is maintained for the balance of the year or not depends largely on the great Lakeview geyser, which is producing at the rate of 50,000 barrels daily, having maintained this record since March 15 last. However, constantly increasing production in the various fields of the state warrant the belief that there will be no material diminution of production even though the Lakeview subsides.

Bourbon and Cossack.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Eastern Oregon, one of the most prominent Republicans of that section, is one of those with whom the assembly plan "sticks in the crop," and he voices his sentiments in part as follows: "The so called assembly movement was born of a union between the Bourbon and the Cossack, the men who imagine that they embody all the wisdom and those who live to destroy. The first are possessed of the idea that the people are incapable of self-government, and the last would emasculate the direct primary because they cannot manipulate it. I am utterly opposed to any assembly to be held before the date of the primary election, and desire to go on record as repudiating the action of this committee, by every true Republican."—Ex.

NEW FISH WARDEN

Edward Clanton of Grants Pass
gets the position.

Salem, Or., June 29.—Edward Clanton, Deputy Fish Warden of District No. 2, was selected yesterday afternoon as Master Fish Warden, to succeed H. C. McAllister, who leaves the office next Saturday. Mr. Clanton was given the position on account of his years of experience with the Oregon fisheries and his marked ability in enforcing the fish laws. Although Henry O'Malley, who was strongly recommended by McAllister, has had many more years' experience than the new Warden, it was deemed more practical to appoint Mr. Clanton, in view of the fact that he is in good repute with all the fishermen in the state, and his past experience with Mr. McAllister during the disturbance among the fishermen on the lower Willamette and Columbia Rivers will enable him to meet such emergencies in the future.
