## CELEBRATION

Program carried out about as published--7 thousand visitors in town.

Monday was a lively day in Jacksonville, the crowds in town Sunday were augmented by arrivals early in the morning by train, by private conveyance, and on foot until a conservative estimate placed the number of visitors at seven thousand.

The program as published in a former issue of the Post was carried out with a few minor changes; the exercises at the court house yard being in charge of Wm. M. Colvig, Esq. of Medford, as chairman instead of Judge Hanna, as announced. Rev. Johnston delivered the invocation instead of Rev. Ennis.

The automobile parade was all right in quality, but was sadly lacking in quantity; only about eight machines appearing in the procession. There were probably eighty automobiles in town, but the majority of owners did not, for some reason, care to enter the parade with their machines.

The music furnished throughout the day and evening by the Medford band was very good and added much zest to the exercises.

There were two ball games in the Nether & Taylor park; one at 10:30 between Medford and Grants Pass teams for a side bet of \$400. which was easily won by Medford, and one at 4 o'clock between Jacksonville and Medford, for which the committee offered a purse of \$100. This was also won by Medford.

The exercises at the court house were said to have been exceptionally fine, by those fortunate enough to get within hearing distance of the speaker's platform, but owing to the proximity of the merry-go-round, and the other noises incident to such an assemblage of people, those at a distance from the platform were unable to hear more than about one word out of every two or three uttered.

In point of numbers the celebration was a great success; the streets being literally packed with a jolly fun-loving crowd, bound on having a good time, and they all seemed to be having it too. The employees of the hotels and various refreshment parlors, booths, stands, etc. were kept on the jump and worked overtime in supplying the wants of the hungry and thirsty multitude.

The closing feature of the occasion was the ball at Orth's Hall, which was so well patronized the dancing floor

was completely filled from start to finish.

The day closed without any serious accidents, and the police report very little disturbance of any kind, in fact considering the size of the crowd, the order was remarkable.

To the Editor:—I wish to acknowledge with thanks your reference to my candidacy for representative to the State legislature in a recent issue of your paper. It is right and due the people of Jacksonville county that they know just where the candidates for a political office stand at the opening of the campaign. The election of members of the State legislature is no longer dependent upon mere personal popularity. It is rather a contest as to the right of the people to rule without fear or favor of a few machine politicians working under the cloak of the Assembly.

The people of Jacksonville county are entitled to know the platform on which I ask for their support. I am a Republican and believe in progressive Republicanism. I believe in the Primary and favor only such amendments to the Primary as will strengthen

and perfect the law, not nullify it. I am absolutely opposed to the Assembly Plan for the reason that its purpose is to nullify the Primary and substitute for it the outgrown convention and caucus system. The Assembly stands for a government by the few for the benefit of the privileged classes. I favor the Primary as against the Assembly because it places political responsibility upon all of the people. I believe in the Initiative, Referendum and Recall. I favor Statement Number One for it enables the people of Oregon to choose their United States Senators, the legislators simply registering the people's choice. Why should not the people of Oregon choose their Senators as well as their Governors and Congressmen? I favor the income tax amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

I believe that free text books should be furnished to every child in our public schools. We furnish free, our schools and teachers for them. Why not free text books? The cost of providing text books oftentimes works a hardship on the family which the State of Oregon should remedy.

If nominated and elected I shall represent all sections of Jackson county fairly and impartially. If the people send me to the legislature I shall favor the enactment into law of those political and moral principles which will uplift the community, the state, and the nation.

The Republican party was born as a party of freedom and progress. The ideals and principles of Lincoln and Roosevelt are dear to me. I believe in these ideals and principles and therefore am persuaded that I can best serve my party by rightly serving the people.

The issue of this campaign as far as the legislature is concerned is that of the Primary vs. the Assembly, the right of the people to rule, as against the rule of the few working through the Assembly. This is the contest in the Republican party. It is a contest to decide whether the plain people, as Lincoln loved to call them, shall rule for the benefit of all, or the few controlled by selfishness and by Privilege, shall make of the party of Lincoln a party of Special Interests, by Special Interests, and for Special Interests. This is not my fight; it is the people's fight. Upon this issue I offer myself as a candidate for the legislature in the Republican Primaries.

## CITY COUNCIL

Holds regular meeting Tuesday evening--Bills allowed--Sidewalk ordinance is passed finally--The Water system discussed.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held Tuesday evening. Present: Councilmen Britt, Dunford, Fick, Grieves, Mayor Shaw, Recorder Dox.

Minutes of previous meetings read and approved. Application of S. E. Dunnington for liquor license, accompanied by bond and treasurer's receipt for license fee, was presented and there being no remonstrance, the bond was approved and license ordered issued.

The usual monthly bills for supplies furnished, labor performed, etc. were presented and allowed.

The ordinance providing for the construction of cement sidewalks along parts of certain streets was, after amendment, put upon its final passage and received the affirmative votes of Messrs Britt, Dunford, and Grieves; Mr. Fick having retired.

The water question was discussed in an informal manner but nothing definite was done except the ordering of a warrant for \$15. to pay the filing fee to the State Engineer.

### JOHNSON WINS

Fight at Reno in the fifteenth round, July 4th.

The big prize fight at Reno, Nev. is over, and resulted in a victory for the black man Johnson in the fifteenth round.

The dailies have been full of the details of the affair, giving the names of persons present, amount of the bets, etc.

It is stated that Johnson received \$120,000. for his share of the proceeds while Jeffries, although defeated, received almost as much, his receipts being given at \$117,000.

As a result of victory by the black, race riots have occurred in several towns in different parts of the country, resulting it is stated, in the death of some 20 persons, mostly negroes.

### WASHINGTON LETTER

Recent bulletins tell of experiments in Agricultural Department.

In a bulletin of the Wisconsin Station, by R. A. Moore and E. J. Delwiche, it is stated that no crop surpasses clover seed as a source of ready money in northern Wisconsin. The demand for it is steadily increasing and the price is good. Instead of depleting the fertility of the soil, clover adds nitrogen from the air and its roots loosen the soil to considerable depth, while the return from hay, seed and straw sometimes reaches \$50 an acre.

P. H. Flint of the Georgia Experiment Station, maintains that in view of the increasing price of commercial feeds more home-grown feeds must be used in order "to make money in growing swine." He insists that more attention should be given in the South to the growing of the more concentrated feeds like soy beans, Spanish peanuts, cowpeas, and corn as hog feed, and he reports experiments which show "that pork can be produced more cheaply when soy beans, Spanish peanuts, and skim milk are made a part of the ration, than when corn and shorts alone are fed."

Considerable study is being given to

the best manner in which to plant corn. In Georgia, it is declared, 3630 plants to the acre give the best results on good land, and 1850 or 2420 hills to the acre on poor land. The average cornfield, according to prominent authorities, has not over 66 per cent of a perfect stand, so that the corn crop lacks about \$70,000,000 of bringing what it really should to the farmer.

A. G. Phillips of the Kansas Experiment Station says that the demand for eggs seems practically unlimited, more especially for the better grades. The growth of the storage industry has tended to equalize prices by increasing the demand in summer when fresh eggs are plentiful and supplying the deficiency in winter when fresh eggs are scarce. Since the demand is greatest for the best grades, it seems obvious that a little more attention to details will result in a profit amply repaying the extra time and labor involved. In order to obtain top prices for eggs, they must be uniform in size, uniform in color, and uniform in quality.

### Business Conditions.

The only unfavorable element in the situation is the unfavorable attitude of federal lawmakers and state officials towards the railways and the spirit which would prevent the companies from moderately advancing their charges to offset the increased cost of operation. When the manufacturer is obliged to pay higher prices for raw material and increased wages he does the only possible thing in the circumstances and correspondingly raises the charge for his product. The railways are obliged to pay increased prices for supplies and higher wages, and it is only reasonable that they should get more for what they sell, namely, transportation.

That they are impelled to raise their charges is plain from current traffic returns showing increased gross takings, while costs of operation have increased in still greater ratio, with resulting decrease in net earnings. Unless the greatest of all industries is permitted to prosper the country cannot be prosperous.

### Still in Race.

The following news item regarding the candidacy of Governor Benson, was given out at Salem, Wednesday.

Salem, Or., July 6.—Governor Benson, who is now in San Francisco, has instructed his private secretary, C. N. McArthur, to announce that his declaration of intention to become a candidate to succeed himself as Secretary of State will arrive in this city within a few days. Dana Allen, Deputy County Clerk for Marion County, returned last evening from San Francisco, and while in that city visited Governor Benson. Mr. Allen says the Governor is looking very well, and expects to return to Oregon within a few weeks.

### Boy Drowns in Rogue River.

Ernest Kinkle was drowned in the Rogue river, at Savage rapids, near Woodville, Monday.

Young Kinkle with several other boys was bathing in the stream and attempted to swim across the river but becoming exhausted was drawn under by the swift flowing water.

He was aged about 15 years. His parents are residents of the Savage creek district.

## PROTEST MADE

Against showing pictures of big fight--Legal and moral objections made.

New York, July 6.—Charging that the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures constitutes the reproduction of an illegal act and insisting that the exhibiting of the pictures amounts practically to the flaunting of a crime in the public's face, the International Association of Police Chiefs today entered the fight against the picture production of the late affair at Reno.

At the last meeting of the association the chiefs put the ban upon exhibiting any pictures of crime. Today they declare the Jeffries-Johnson fight is the sort of fight that is a crime in most states and as a result they cannot sanction a broadcast reproduction of the battle in pictures.

The Christian Endeavor society, with headquarters in Boston, today also came into the fight. Secretary William Shaw wired every governor in the country, in addition to the mayors of many cities, urging them to exclude the pictures. He also urged President Taft, former President Roosevelt and Governor Hughes of New York to lend the anti-picture movement their influence. In his telegram to the governors and mayors Secretary Shaw says:

"Race riots and murders have already followed the announcement of Johnson's victory. The moving pictures will create more violence. Will you join in an appeal to prohibit the exhibition of the pictures? Help save the young people from demoralizing shows."
