

### KILLED BY TRAIN

Thomas C. Smith run down and killed near Central Point.

Thomas E. Smith, aged about 30, a native of Maryland, and a ranch hand employed on the Beall farm near Central Point, was run down and instantly killed by section 1 of Southern Pacific train No. 16 while walking along the track at the Snowy Butte orchard Tuesday evening. He was evidently hurled under the car wheels, for he was decapitated and his body crushed to a pulp.

When the second section was nearing Central Point the body of a man was seen lying alongside the track.

The matter was reported at the station, a few hundred yards away and an investigation made as to identity. He proved to be Thomas E. Smith, who had been employed on the Beall ranch for several months. Smith had celebrated the Fourth and returned to the ranch Tuesday morning. He went to bed about 1 o'clock in the afternoon. He came to Medford on No. 13 and returned to Central Point on the motor.

From the surrounding circumstances it is evident that while going home, along a narrow path running close to the railway, the fatality happened. The engine must have passed him and the suction of the train probably caused him to fall beneath the wheels. His head was cut off and his body badly torn. The first section of the train reporting nothing indicates that he was not struck by the engine.

The body was removed by orders of the coroner to the Central Point morgue and the inquest held Wednesday afternoon.

Smith was about 30 years of age and has relatives in Maryland who have been communicated with.—Tribune.
