

AEROPLANE BOMBS

Will cut little figure in naval warfare says Scientific American.

An editorial article in the Scientific American of July 13, says in part as follows: "The Scientific American has no wish to depreciate the skill shown by Curtiss in successfully dropping imitation bombs within an area which represented the deck of a battleship; but in the interests of truth and cold logic, we feel compelled to give it as our opinion that, so far as the future of naval warfare is concerned, this dexterous feat of the aviator has but little significance."

It was inevitable, when an art so difficult and seemingly impossible as that of human flight had once been demonstrated, that the enthusiasm of its votaries would carry them into the fields of wild speculation and prophecy, and that each initial success, however modest, would be taken as proving to a demonstration many a difficult problem, whose practical solution could be arrived at by only the well-beaten road of experiment and accumulated experience.

Now, of all the bewildering tasks which, by common consent, seem to have been assigned to the aeroplane—the most sensitive, delicate, and, in its manipulation, at least, by far the most difficult means of human locomotion—that of dropping missiles from the air with such accuracy as to hit an object lying at least a thousand feet below, is by long odds the most difficult of accomplishment.

To hit a battleship with aeroplane bombs, even if they be let go from the perfected flyer of the future, is a problem most complicated. We do not hesitate to say that to take accurate aim from a safe height, clear of shrapnel fire, would involve such very accurate data and such complicated calculations of height, speed of aeroplane, speed of ship, speed of falling shell, wind velocity, direction of aeroplane flight, etc., and the shell if it did strike home would do such insignificant damage, that to affirm that the aeroplane is going to "revolutionize" the naval warfare of the future is to be guilty of the wildest exaggeration.

Far be it from us to deny that the vision of a fleet of aeroplanes sweeping like a cloud of mosquitoes above the doomed fleet of the enemy, and dropping a rain of deadly bombs into the very vitals of a fleet of cumbersome and costly battleships, which lies below utterly incapable of defense, is a picture altogether dramatic and awe-inspiring; but we cannot forget that outside of the question of the ability of the aeroplane to hit a battleship with some form of high explosive missile, there lies the fundamental fact that attack by high explosives falling out of the heavens has already, in the test of actual warfare, been proved to be very disappointing in the amount of damage which it is able to effect."

FENCES VS COYOTES

Government plan tried by Mr. Taylor and proven good.

The enclosure of sheep range within a coyote-proof fence has been tried in Colorado by F. H. Taylor, of Mancos, with highly satisfactory results. An experiment begun by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the Watowa National Forest, in Oregon, to discover whether sheep could advantageously be pastured within such an enclosure, led Mr. Taylor to give the new method a trial. The outcome is set forth in a letter to the Department, as follows:

"After reading the description of your coyote-proof fence in Oregon, I constructed a fence to enclose about 500 acres in the same manner. The fence was constructed during the fall of 1908, and in the spring of 1909 and 1910 one thousand head of ewes were lambed in this enclosure." In the vernacular of the herder, "one hundred per cent of the lambs were saved," that is, a lamb to each ewe, "and one man did all the work. I think the per cent of the lambs would have been higher, but one animal, presumably a coyote, was inside when the fence was constructed. It was impossible to capture this animal even with hounds. Some of the herders thought the animal was not a coyote, but since coyote tracks were found in several places I am of the opinion that it was. Whatever the animal was it raised its young inside the enclosure."

Connecting his loss with the rapacity of this animal Mr. Taylor says: "A great many of the lambs were killed and a small hound eaten behind foreleg and the remainder of the carcass was untouched. On the land outside of the enclosure it required the services of three men and a pack of hounds to care for one thousand ewes, and only 95 per cent of the lambs were saved. This per cent could not have been saved without the assistance of the hounds."

"I consider this fence a splendid investment since it easily pays for itself in three years. On the other

hand, it is often difficult and sometimes impossible to get men during the lambing season. For this reason the money value of the fence can hardly be estimated."

The Department of Agriculture entered upon the experiment of enclosing sheep range within a fence which would turn stock, destroying animals in the belief that this method would save forage as well as stock and wages. This belief has been fully justified by the results. The Oregon enclosure carried more sheep than an equal area of range of the same quality outside, produced a heavier lamb crop, heavier sheep, and more wool, and at the same time resulted in a better condition of the range itself. These advantages are due to the different behavior of sheep pastured within such an enclosure from that of sheep herded in the ordinary way.

Apple Show At Spokane, Wash.

Unique in conception, original in plan, broad in purpose and educational in result will be the Third National Apple Show, in Spokane, Washington, November 14 to 19, 1910.

Two previous shows, conducted under the same auspices, established new records in apple exhibitions. The first National Apple Show, in Spokane, December 6 to 11, 1908, attracted world-wide attention. Nearly a million apples were shown in competition. The second show, held November 15 to 20, 1909, was twice the size of the first show, covering three acres of ground and housing more than 1,500,000 choicest specimens of the King of Fruits.

The Third National Apple Show promises to eclipse all previous exhibitions. Interest aroused by the two first exhibitions, when 23 states and two provinces competed for prizes, has been steadily maintained. Buildings covering four acres of ground are necessary to provide adequate room. Prizes are open in the greatest variety of contests ever offered, ranging from full carloads of 639 bushels down to a single apple. Premiums aggregate in value \$20,000, including cash prizes, trophies, silver cups, orchard machinery, spray material, nursery stock, engraved banners and medals.

For the championship carload of standard winter apples there will be a cash prize of \$1,000
