

MAYOR GAYNOR

Of New York shot in back of neck by assassin.

Mayor W. J. Gaynor of New York, was shot and dangerously wounded at 9:45 Tuesday morning as he stood on the deck of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse at Hoboken, about to start on a month's vacation in Europe. The shooting was done by a man who later gave his name as James J. Gallagher, and his residence as 440 Third avenue, New York. He was later identified as an employe who was recently discharged. Three shots were fired, two of which missed, but the third lodged in the fleshy portion of the left side of the neck. Blood gushed from the wound, and the first hasty examination led to the belief that the wound was serious, and would perhaps result fatally. The mayor retained consciousness, and later examinations by the physicians at the hospital gave a more hopeful outlook.

News Of The State.

The Evangelical camp meeting, an annual event in Columbia county, will be in session at Vernonia next week.

Jesse Parker, a well-known resident of Elgin, shot and fatally wounded his father-in-law, William Porter, in front of the latter's residence, Friday evening. Porter died next day, and Parker is being held by the sheriff on a charge of murder.

The hop crop of the state is reported short, but the quality is excellent. It is estimated that 90,000 bales will be the extent of the crop this year.

Mrs. Anna H. Bender, died at Myrtle Point, last week aged 90 years.

Fishhawk postoffice, located 5 miles northwest of Mist, will be discontinued August 15, by order of the department.

A farmer living at Bend, has perfected an invention whereby power is applied to all four of the wheels of an auto instead of only to the two rear wheels as at present.

Johnston's mill, located three miles from Coquille City was burned last week as a result of an explosion in the electric plant. Loss about \$100,000.

Otto Johnson, a hunter of Estacada, was shot by a companion, in mistake for a deer, last week.

Mrs. Crabtree of Camp Creek, near Eugene, who is but 36 years old, gave birth to her twelfth child, last week. Nine of the children are living.

Fierce forest fires are raging in the timber near Jewell, in Clatsop county.

Springfield will hold a three days' celebration to mark the completion of the electric road into that place, August 18 to 20.

Dr. W. S. McNichol, of Hood River, narrowly escaped death in a crevasse while climbing Mt. Hood, Sunday. He slid 800 ft. down the glacier and plunged head first into a crevasse but emerged a few minutes later with only a few scratches.

Light Sparks.

Flora, Wallowa county, is to have a third hotel, and is otherwise blooming.

Building permits to the amount of over \$80,000 were issued in Eugene in July.

A "caterpillar" threshing outfit cut 65 acres of grain in one day in Umatilla county.

Eugene claims to have more street railway than any other town of its size in the country.

Large numbers of the toothsome tomcod are being caught near the mouth of the Columbia.

Just now everything points to a lively development of mines in the country tributary to Sumpter, says the Baker City Democrat.

Seven hundred excursionists came to Newport last Sunday, and one can number the visitors by the thousands, says a correspondent.

In five precincts in Harney county, up to last week, not a voter had registered. Evidently the people are not much excited over politics up there.

Cottage Grove Sentinel: Seven years ago J. H. Baker dug up an apple tree, conveyed it six miles and reset it. At that time the tree was 25 years old. This season he has taken by actual count 1000 apples therefrom to keep the weight from breaking down the tree, which is still "loaded to the guards."

Dallas Itemizer: The trains on the west side now carry an auditor, who takes up the tickets, giving the conductor more time to attend to his other duties. Travel on that line is quite brisk, it taking several coaches to accommodate the goers and comers, and especially on the Sheridan run is the increase in travel noted.

Grass Valley Journal: It is predicted by most everyone that this harvest season will be very short on account of the grain ripening so fast; heading has been in full blast for two weeks and every effort is being made to get the grain in the stack; the wind during the past few days has from reports caused many a kernel to go to the ground.

The American Light & Water Co. has finished laying six miles of pipe for the new \$100,000 mountain water system now under construction, says the Cottage Grove Sentinel. This stretch is from the intake on Laying creek towards Cottage Grove, and is the most difficult to build, the cuts being heavy at several points, with large boulders in the trenches.

A Minneapolis man, who has recently settled near Creswell is most favorably impressed with that section for fruit-growing, and expresses the opinion that it is equalled by no other. He says apples and pears can be raised there more cheaply than in other localities he has visited, while the fruit is of superior quality. He will develop his fruit farm to the highest possible degree.

Correspondent of Dallas Observer: Perrydale is a beautiful town of about 200 people, lying on the Southern Pacific railroad ten miles north of Dallas, in a fertile valley of farm land, which, for richness of soil and productivity, has no superior in the state of Oregon. While the place is not large, almost every house shows a recent application of paint. Every residence shows care and pride on the part of its owner.—Journal.

GUN WAS LOADED

When young man pulled trigger. Brother-in-law dies as result.

Roseburg' Or., Aug. 8.—R. L. Sears, a Southern Pacific brakeman, of Los Angeles, Cal., died at Mercy Hospital, in this city, Sunday morning from a bullet wound inflicted by his brother-in-law, W. R. Young, of Grants Pass, during a fishing trip Saturday afternoon on Rogue River, four miles west of Merlin, Josephine County. Sears a few hours before his death wrote letters to his mother and sister, explaining that the shooting was accidental.

The two men were testing the triggers of revolvers which they bought Friday, and Young's weapon, unknown to him, was loaded. With the muzzle pointed directly at his relative, Young discharged the revolver and the bullet entered the region of Sears' abdomen, piercing the intestines in four places. The northbound overland train train, No. 15, brought him to this city, in company with his wife, to whom he was married only a year ago, and their infant daughter.

First in the field. Full county ticket named.

The Socialists are the first to inaugurate their political campaign in Jackson County, and have put up the following ticket for the election in November. State Senator, E. Morrison, Medford; Representative, R. P. Simpson, Ashland; County Commissioner, W. P. Gould, Medford; Sheriff, Harvey Richardson, Agate; Assessor, W. Austin, Medford; Clerk, H. Chamberlain, Talent; Recorder, E. J. Odell, Agate; Treasurer, J. E. Crews, Gold Hill; Superintendent of Schools, L. L. Renne, Medford; Coroner, Matt Calhoun. The platform adopted strongly favored Government, state and municipal ownership of all public utilities and of timber, coal mines and water power. The amendment to the constitution, to be voted on at the state election in November, to allow women taxpayers to vote, was also favored.
