

COTTON TRUST

Is the latest says the Detroit Daily News.

The latest trust to be launched is one which embraces cotton mills, sales agencies, plantations and all the countless thousands of spindles that weave 3000 varieties of cotton fabrics like magic, says the Detroit Daily News. The capitalization is \$20,000,000, supplied by powerful interests. The motive is to centralize, to economize, to increase the selling price and dictate the market. The immediate cause was the Payne-Aldrich cotton schedule. Perhaps later information will disclose how that schedule was manipulated with this end in view, as in the case of the rubber and lead mergers. But that is another matter. Viewing the situation broadly, one sees the irresistible onward sweep of combinations. Whether the movement is beneficial or not, it is certainly a profoundly marked feature of social evolution. From the individual spinning wheel to the colossal engine of manufacture embraced in this \$20,000,000 merger with its myriad fingers moving in obedience to one head and one will is a tremendous development for one century. Popular Government

Mr. Taft, in one of his speeches in the last campaign, indicated, in a passing allusion to a then minor issue, that he looked with favor upon the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

It is an issue that every State in the Union must meet, and it has such important bearing upon popular government as a whole that it is decidedly national.

Many States, notably Democratic at the South—there are few Democratic States elsewhere—choose their Senators and their State officials as well by primary election. No State that has given a fair test to an honest primary law would voluntarily return to the convention system, with the dishonest machine practices which it invites and involves.

One State, and one State only—the Republican State of Oregon—has attained a complete form of popular government that excludes corruption, has destroyed machine politics, and is immediately responsive to the people's will. Oregon, leading the way, occupies to-day a unique and enviable position in the family of States. The reform movement, begun some years ago, was stubbornly resisted, called socialistic in the extreme, and jeered at as impracticable and impossible of realization this side of the millennium. Now an accomplished fact, the State points to it with pride, and the country watches its successful operation with growing admiration.

Freeed from partisan abuses, out of the grasp of selfish interest, Oregon goes prosperously and self-respectingly on her way. Given an opportunity to rule, the people out there are demonstrating that they can rule wisely and well.

What Oregon has done other States must do, if the government of the United States is to be popular government, as its patriotic founders intended it should be.

Question of the tariff, control of the trusts, railroad regulation, conservation, and the like—each and all of these are dwarfed into insignificance by the importance of the paramount problems of popular government—State and national. Once solve these as Oregon has solved them, by creating an honest electorate and giving the people the power to rule parties instead of allowing parties to rule the people, and other questions will speedily and righteously adjust themselves.

Politicians may not see it—selfish interests may retard its progress for a time—but statesmen see and realize that this issue of popular government is the biggest issue before the country and must inevitably win, if the nation would survive and thrive.

Government of the people, for the people, and by the people is as essential now as in our strength—as it was essential in our weakness—and no true patriot is blind to the fact.—Washington Herald.

Better Feeding.

From a letter written by Dr. Withcombe, director of the Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station, the following extracts are taken:

The Northwest offers unlimited opportunities for producing high-class beef. Despite the fact that corn may not be available, other feed stuffs equally as good can be produced in great abundance. Good killing stuff can be secured from well-cured wild or alfalfa hay. There is little waste in feeding well-cured alfalfa hay cut at the proper season, but when over-ripe or coarse its value will be increased from 20 to 25 per cent by running it through a cutter.

Some grain or succulent feed should be fed with hay to fatten cattle. In practically all of the stock feeding districts the field pea or fodder can be grown. If these are ensiled and fed in the following ration—15 pounds of alfalfa or wild hay, 30 pounds of corn or pea silage and 5 pounds of rolled barley, a gain of 2 pounds per day should be secured for a period of 90 days. If would put the steer in prime condition and thus add from 1 to 2 cents per pound to the value of his initial weight.

Another excellent feed for fattening cattle is a combination of alfalfa and beardless barley hay. These may be grown separately or in many instances grown together advantageously. For example, fields where alfalfa is not thickly set should be thoroughly disced with a spike-tooth disc in the spring and beardless barley drilled in and the whole cut for hay. This combination is excellent for putting beef cattle in the very best condition for market.

Croup

Dairy Products as Food.

The products of the dairy are perhaps the most useful articles included in the human diet. A meal made up of dishes into which no product of the dairy cow enters would not be such as to inspire "the turnpike road to people's hearts I find lies through their mouths, or I mistake mankind." Take away the butter for the bread, the cream for the coffee and the porridge, the shortening in the crust and the biscuits, the milk in the gravy and in the puddings, the cream for the dessert and the various kinds of cheese which please and satisfy, then take away the cup of milk for the little one and the meal that would be left would be neither tempting nor nutritious.

The health of our people depends so much upon an adequate supply of pure dairy products that even a scarcity is always attended by suffering and death.

Butter is sometimes referred to as luxury, this a mistake. Butter is not a luxury but one of the necessities of life, and its composition is such that nothing can take its place and perform the same functions. It is nature's product compounded in the maternal organism and the process is in accordance with nature's law, a law which man can imitate but cannot understand. Man can manufacture from various fats and oils a substitute for butter but it cannot take the place of nature's product because man cannot understand the needs of the human body as nature understands them.

The animal body is developed best when nourished by foods which have been little manipulated by man and machinery. Dairy products are, as a rule, consumed as nature produced them. This is particularly true with milk upon which the growing body must depend. In the case of butter only a small percentage of other products are added to the fat extracted from the milk. Man only manipulates it in order to put it in convenient shape for use. It can still be termed a product of nature designed as only nature can design for use as food by the human body.
