Reports from different localities in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, indicate that the forest fires now raging are unusually destructive, owing to the protracted dry spell in a great measure. The territory covered by the fires is not so large as in several former years but the lack of moisture has caused the fires to burn more rapidly. The loss of life is estimated at from 80 to 100, and the property loss will run into the millions. Men of experience are firm in the belief that much of the danger from forest fires and most of the damage to standing timber could be eliminated by burning the dead leaves, twigs, etc. early in the season, before the dry spell sets in and when the fire could be easily controlled. The ground would not require burning over every year, but say once in three years or so.

About as good a way to study human nature is when you are driving on the public road. New Record.

At the Lanark Aviation Meet in Scotland last week Cattaneo, on a Bleriot monoplane, made a new British record for a long distance flight by covering 141 miles at an average speed of 44.16 miles an hour. In addition to this record and the height record made by Drexel, mentioned above, Robert Lorraine, the American actor made a magnificent flight in his Farman biplane, from Blackpool, England, to a point near Llandudno, on the north coast of Wales. From this point he again set out for Holyhead, at 5:30 P. M. He passed Ormes Head at a high speed, heading in the direction of the Isle of Man. He finally alighted at Camlyn, on the north of Anglesey. His failure to reach Holyhead was due to the fog. This flight of about 50 miles across the Irish Sea is probably the longest straightway flight over water up to the present time. Lorraine found the fog a great hindrance.—Scientific American.

Lakeview Examiner: Last Saturday O. T. McKendree bought 7000 lambs of Dave Elder, paying \$3.25 per head for them. He will drive them to Klamath Falls and from there ship to southern markets.

The fishery agent at Wallowa says that the best plan to secure trout for that section is to procure the eggs and leave them for incubation at the hatchery on the Wallowa river. This will save a great deal of expense.

Abraham Lincoln Brown, capitalist of San Francisco, is looking over the city and country with a view to making some investments, says the Klamath Falls Chronicle. Mr. Brown says we have as good a chance here to build a city as Los Angeles or Seattle, just in proportion to our natural advantages and resources.

The canning of pears has begun at the cannery, says the Eugene Register. They are also busy packing peaches and pears. HENS NOT STUPID.

Merely Follow Natural Instincts Left Them by Their Ancestors.

Every automobilist knows that when his car approaches a hen instead of timidly stepping to the side of the road and safety in nine cases out of ten she runs along ahead in hysterical excitement, doing what she should have done in the first place only when completely exhausted and then only by accident apparently. Other domestic animals have the same annoying habit, and as it often causes their wholly needless death, the usual explanation of it is their stupidity. That is an unfair criticism, for neither birds nor animals are ever stupid—never are, that is, about meeting exigencies which their ancestors were in the habit of meeting.

It is the lesson of immemorial experience for all these creatures that from the pursuit of an enemy that cannot be fought there is safety if anywhere in straightaway flight at topmost speed. Motion in any other direction would give the pursuer a fatal advantage by enabling him to "cut corners" and cover a shorter distance than his selected prey. The hen's mistake is not in running along the road, but in assuming that the automobile wants to catch her and will do so if it can. That assumption is a perfectly natural one, and every living hen is the descendant of innumerable generations of hens that acted upon it exactly as she does.—New York Times.

Brougham and Muled Port.

Lord Brougham who as a member of the house of commons was a most abstemious man, upon his promotion to the peerage acquired less commendable habits.
