#### To Catch Votes

Gold Hill, Or., Sept. 16.—The most sensational development of the campaign here thus far was the accusation by Judge Wm. M. Colvig, candidate for the state senate on an anti-statement No. 1 platform, that one of his opponents, who professes to favor that statement, is not at heart a statement No. 1 man, but is advocating it merely to catch votes. He challenged any Von der Hellen supporter in the audience to dispute this damaging accusation, but no voice was raised. Mr. Colvig was very frank in stating his opposition to statement No. 1, but said that he would vote for the republican who received the highest number of votes for United States senator, if nominated and elected.—Gold Hill News. (Paid Advertisement.)

### Mr Cambers' Candidacy.

In gratuitously suggesting that J. J. Cambers get out of the race for the republican nomination for state senator, the Medford Mail Tribune usurps the supposed function of the malodorous assembly. In assuming that Mr. Cambers has no chance whatever in the three-cornered contest with Von der Hellen and Colvig, the Medford paper takes to itself an amount of political discernment only equalled by that claimed for the same corporation-fostered body. Who is the editor of the Medford Mail Tribune that he should be able, by a process of editorial cony-meeny-miny-mo, to declare "You're out," to any candidate for any position?

The Mail Tribune urges, in support of its dictatorial "suggestion," that, with Cambers eliminated, Von der Hellen would be able to down that splendid old reactionary, Judge Colvig. Cambers is to lie down and let Von der Hellen gallop over him to victory. However satisfactory this supine course of procedure would be to Von der Hellen and the Mail Tribune, there are plenty of people who see no reason why Mr. Cambers hasn't just as good or a better chance for the nomination than either of his opponents, and who glory in his determination to stay in the fight to the finish.

As a matter of fact Mr. Cambers was the first to announce his candidacy for state senator from Jackson county, and if any priority rights are to be declared, as the Mail Tribune seems to think there should be, they are his. His platform is all that any believer in honest, progressive legislation can ask. He has never gone before any convention or assembly as a candidate, which is more than can be said of either of his opponents. He is a perfect example of the type of candidate made possible by the direct primary—the candidate who looks to no boss for the word to become a candidate, to no assembly for an endorsement, who with no political pull other than a platform of honest principles, goes before the voters of his party and asks them to make him their nominee. There is about him nothing of the professional politician, a man like Cambers had about as much chance of nomination under the convention system—or would have under its illegitimate successor, the assembly—as a pullet that strays into a Georgia revival has of salvation. But under the direct primary, men like Cambers are able to be nominated and elected, to the purification of American politics and the great benefit of the American people.

The admonition of the Mail Tribune that Mr. Cambers, for the sake of electing its pet candidate, Von der Hellen, sacrifice his own aspirations, is as resplendent a piece of gall as can well be imagined, even from the source whence it comes. It would appear that no political party in southern Oregon need resort to the cumbersome and expensive assembly to provide itself with nominees. Just leave the whole matter to the Mail Tribune, whose automatic editorial nomination-mill can turn out the right man for the place while you wait. In fact, what is the use of having a primary election, anyway, when there is a paper in Medford that is willing to save the people the trouble and expense of one?

But perhaps, after all, this is mere ideal dreaming. Maybe the people still have sufficient interest in political affairs to pick their own candidates. Perhaps there are candidates, even, who need no newspaper advice from Medford or elsewhere as to the conduct of their candidacy. Mr. Cambers, at least, declines to accept the inglorious part assigned him to play by the Mail Tribune. He flatly refuses to "be the goat," for his opponent with the double-jointed cognomen.

And perhaps the people will take a fancy to the man who will not become a political doormat for even the mighty Von der Hellen, of Wellen. There's no telling.—Gold Hill News. (Paid Advertisement.)
