There is a large amount of road work now in contemplation by the county court and the undersigned as a member of the court would like to see it completed. Would not the experience gained by previous service be of substantial benefit to the taxpayers of the county?

If I shall be renominated and re-elected by the voters of the county I shall have the money available for road improvement and the money appropriated for other purposes expended in an economical manner and in a way that will return to the taxpayers the best possible results.

ORDINANCE NO. 133.

An Ordinance accepting right of way deed, subject to conditions therein named, from Emil Britt and Amalia Britt to a certain right of way and easement for a pipe line, reservoir site and other purposes for a water system for the City of Jacksonville, State of Oregon.

The People of the City of Jacksonville Do Ordain as follows:

Section I.

Whereas, the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, is constructing and is about to construct a municipal water system for said City in the manner required by law.

Section II.

And, Whereas, by a survey of the proposed pipe line and pipe lines and storage reservoir sites, caused to be made by said City of Jacksonville, the most feasible right of way and location of the said pipe lines and reservoirs for said water system is in part in, upon and across certain property hereinafter described, belonging to the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt, of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon.

Section III.

And, Whereas, the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt did on the 6th day of September, A. D. 1910, duly sign, seal and deliver to the said city of Jacksonville, Oregon, a good and sufficient right of way deed to an easement for a storage reservoir and a right of way for a pipe line or pipe lines in, on and across the following described tract or parcel of land, lying being and situated in Jackson County, State of Oregon, belonging to the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt in fee simple, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point 240 feet South of the North One Quarter corner of Section 31, Township 37 South, of Range 2 West, of the W. M. running thence South 79 deg. 15 min. East 180 feet; thence North 85 deg. 50 min. East 1019 feet; thence South 81 deg. East 178 feet; thence South 54 deg. 30 min. East 637 feet to City Service Reservoir; thence S. 81 deg 20 min. E. 1240 feet to intersection of Laurel and Fir Streets, Jacksonville, Jackson County, Oregon, for pipe line right of way, and the reservoir site is to be located within said Section, township and range and along the said right of way or adjacent thereto.

The description of the said right of way and the said reservoir site herein referred to being more particularly described in the said grant deed herein referred to which is hereby made for the purpose of a description thereof and for all the purposes of this ordinance.

Section IV.

And, Whereas, the conditions of said grant of said easement for said right of way for said pipe line or pipe lines and for said reservoir site, herein above referred to, are as follows, to-wit:

The said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, shall use the said easement and right of way and reservoir site for a pipe or pipe lines and storage reservoir sites only and other purposes incidental thereto for a municipal water system, for the purpose of supplying the said city of Jacksonville, Oregon and its inhabitants with water, and in the event that at any time the said city of Jacksonville, Oregon shall cease to use the same for such purpose, title to the said easement and right of way and reservoir site shall revert to and be reinvested in the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt their heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, and the said grant and the whole thereof shall thereupon become void.

And the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt shall have the right and privilege to tap and make connection with the water main of the herein mentioned water system with a three fourths inch standard pipe at any place within the official boundaries of the said city of Jacksonville and thereby and there through to divert, flow and draw the water of said water system unobstructed through said pipe to the full capacity thereof, subject, however, to the conditions hereinafter and in said deed contained. Nevertheless the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt shall in no case tap the said water main or pipe line as herein referred to more than one place at more than one time, and shall not be allowed the use of the water in more than one tapping

at more than one time, and shall be subject to and governed by, in all respects, all rules, regulations, restrictions and requirements of the said city of Jacksonville in reference to the use of said water and water system, in like manner, and with like force and effect, with all other water users of said water system, and shall not enjoy or have any special immunities, rights or privileges in the premises, or in the use of said water, except, however, that said water and the use thereof unto the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt their heirs, successors in interest and assigns shall be free of any cost, charge, payment or other compensation.

Section V.

And, Whereas, the said city of Jacksonville is desirous of accepting said deed to the said pipe line and reservoir right of way and site herein referred to with the conditions of the same.

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the premises, the said right of way deed, herein above mentioned and referred to, from the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt for a pipe line or pipe lines and reservoir site for a municipal water system for the purpose of supplying water to the said city of Jacksonville and its inhabitants, in, on, over and across the property herein above described and belonging to the said Emil Britt and Amalia Britt is hereby declared to be, and the same hereby is expressly accepted by the said city of Jacksonville.

Section VI.

That the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, hereby expressly binds itself to all of the conditions, covenants, and agreements of the said right of way deed and in this ordinance.

Section VII.

That this Ordinance be published in the manner required by law and the rules and regulations of the said city of Jacksonville, Oregon.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Jacksonville, County of Jackson, State of Oregon, on the 6th day of September A. D. 1910, by the following vote, to-wit:
