THE PRIMARY ELECTION TO-DAY.

The primary election for nomination of candidates for various offices, to be voted for at the November election is being held today. Pamphlets containing names of candidates who filed their petitions with the Secretary of State 40 days before the primary have been sent out, of these it is scarcely necessary to make mention; if you believe in direct government by the people, vote for the direct primary candidate, but if you think that "ring rule" is best and feel the need of a guardian to direct your choice you should support the assembly candidates.

Regarding the county offices the matter is a little different: for each office except County Clerk and Treasurer, we have two or more candidates, all honest men, but the abilities and qualifications of the candidates differ; in some instances it will be a matter of some difficulty for the voter to decide who is the best fitted for, and who will fill the position in the manner best suited to the interests of the people, in this matter the voter will no doubt be governed by the previous record of the candidate, his expressed sentiments, etc. No doubt the selection made to-day will be ratified at the polls in November and the wisdom or otherwise of such selection will be manifested in the future.

Fine duck hunting now in many parts of Oregon.

Hermiston and vicinity is getting many immigrants.

Medford will have 38 new arc lights and a big trunk sewer.

An Oswego man has already bought and delivered more than 800 tons of hay, and has now an order for 1500 tons more, which he thinks he will be able to get. It is being obtained in the south part of Yamhill and the north part of Polk counties.

The most profitable orchard in the world is the seven and one-half acre Bartlett pear orchard south of Medford owned by John G. Gore, says the Mail Tribune. For four years past this orchard has netted its grower \$1200 an acre annually. For ten years it has averaged over \$800 an acre annually. It is 22 years old.

The prune crop in Lane county is pretty well harvested and is excellent quality, though hardly up to some of the big years in quantity. The price still continues good and good money will be made from the land on which they were grown.

Two fine big lucks, a 400-pound black bear and 30 gallons of huckleberries were the net results of the outing taken by some Gold Hill men, J. T. and H. C. Bailey and Doll Moore, at the headwaters of Elk creek.

A Seaside man captured an old and exceptionally large porcupine. The capture was made near the mouth of the river, and how the animal got here is a mystery. A porcupine has never been seen this side of the mountains before that anyone knows of, and the most plausible theory is that the quilled rodent came from a passing vessel, relates the Signal-Journal.

Poultry Contest.

The poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural College, under Prof. James Dryden, is organizing a poultry raising contest for the boys and girls of Eugene, in co-operation with the Young Men's Christian Association there, similar to the Portland contest organized last year, which closes next November. Some 200 children and 500 older persons are enrolled in the reading course at Portland, and 50 entered the juvenile contest for the \$200 in cash prizes offered.

At the college ten acres of land are given over entirely to the poultry husbandry department, which has now about 2,000 chickens. There are 20 colony brooder coops and 14 colony laying houses, beside the incubator house, containing 16 incubators of six different makes, and the breeder house. The work of the department is largely that of proving the laying qualities of the principal varieties, including Plymouth Rocks, Leghorns, and crosses of these two breeds.

In a recent letter from St. Petersburg, Russia, Prof. Dryden was assured by one of the government lecturers on poultry raising there that the O. A. C. poultry bulletins have been of great value in her work, teaching her, she said, "just what to say, and how to say many things in a few words." The bulletins are published for general distribution in the state, and may be had upon request.

A Famous Statue.

The great temple of Zeus Olympius at Olympia, Greece, was 354 feet long and 174 wide. The columns of this famous shrine were 60 feet in height and 6½ feet in diameter and are the largest which now remain of ancient architecture in marble. Sixteen of the wonderful columns are still standing and are among the most imposing in the world. In this temple stood the colossal statue of Zeus, forty feet high, on a pedestal of twenty. This statue was the masterpiece of Phidias, the world's greatest artist, and so famous was it that it was considered a calamity to die without seeing it. The immortal work was removed to Constantinople by Theodosius I. and was destroyed by fire in the year 475 A. D.
