THE APPLE SHOW

List of events at the Third National Apple Show, Nov. 14-19.

Among the features will be the free apple packing school conducted every forenoon under the direction of J. M. Carroll and A. P. Bateham. We have instituted this school because of the educational value to the growers and to help relieve the demand for apple packers which far exceeds the present supply.

Monday, November 14, the opening day, will witness the first "Live Wire Convention" in the Northwest. We have arranged this feature because apple culture is being encouraged and fostered through the commercial bodies and we deem it proper that they should have formal recognition on this occasion.

On the opening night the Queen's coronation will take place. This will be a magnificent spectacle, produced with all pomp and ceremony appropriate for such an event.

Ladies' and Children's Day will be Tuesday, November 15, when the public schools of Spokane will close in order that the children may visit this exhibition, our school board considering our show of educational value to the pupils.

On Wednesday, November 16, we will have an apple packing contest among experts from all over the Northwest who will compete for cash prizes.

Thursday, November 17, will be Country Life Day, celebrated with appropriate program and a convention of all persons interested in this big movement.

Friday, November 18, will be known as College Day, when the faculties and students of all Northwestern colleges have been invited to attend and enjoy special programs in their interest.

Following the close of the show on Saturday, November 19, we shall take all of the District Displays, besides six of the carload exhibits and all of the winners in the commercial classes, to Chicago where we will give a week's exhibition. November 28 to December 4.

Demonstrations in apple cookery, band concerts, vaudeville programs, meeting of growers and other conventions will add to your pleasure and instruction during the week.

Benefit Farmers.

The public roads of a county are the property of the people of that county—of all the people. The condition of these roads is of especial importance to the farmer, for he must travel them as well as his pleasure. Everything he sells and everything he buys must be hauled over these roads. It is not so much a question to the farmer of how far he has to have his produce hauled as it is of how long it will take him to make the trip and how much he can haul at one load. If he has a good, smooth, hard road (good and smooth and hard in the winter as well as in the summer) from his home to his market-place he is better off (really nearer) at ten miles than he is at less than half that distance on the ordinary mud road. In every view of the case, there is nothing of greater importance to the farmer, to all farmers, than the condition of the public roads. Good roads, save time and money, and value to the farm and make farm life more pleasant and attractive in every way.

PORTLAND LETTER.

Good Roads workers will hold convention—Poultry show at Pendleton.

Portland, Or., Nov. 1, (Special)—Arrangements are now being made by the State Good Roads Association upon the expected passage of Amendment No. 354 to the Constitution, giving the privilege to counties to bond themselves, to call a convention of good roads enthusiasts to be held in Portland immediately after the election on Nov. 8. This convention will be made up of delegates to be appointed from the State Thresher's Association by Secretary Phil. S. Bates, from the County Good Roads associations organized by Chairman L. R. Webster, and will also include county judges as well as members of the State Automobile Association.

At this convention the proper methods of handling the expenditure of the bonding issues will be discussed as well as the appointment of a state highway engineer and the utilization of the state convicts and county prisoners in the work in view.

The result of this convention will be the basis for an appeal to the next session of the legislature at which time it is expected that Oregon will place the most advanced good roads law on her statute books of any state in the Union. Oregon is now leading nationally in good roads work and this meeting will be the largest of like character ever held in the United States.

Pendleton will have a big poultry show lasting one full week commencing December 13. The poultry exhibition is now a permanent feature for Pendleton, it having recently been incorporated under the name of the Umatilla-Morrow County Poultry Association. Last year's exhibit was declared to be the most successful "first show" ever held in the Northwest and hereafter there promises to be a splendid collection of poultry on view at each annual exhibition. Pens have been arranged so that over 1,000 fowls can be properly housed at the approaching show.

The 1911 national convention of the Christian church will be held in Portland churches, the commercial club and the co-operation of the whole Coast. A temporary structure housing 10,000 people, will be built to care for the gathering and thousands of delegates from all parts of the country will attend. The convention bureau of the Commercial Club has under consideration plans for the entertainment of the visitors.

The Harvest Festival that proved such a success this year will be perpetuated as an annual event. This was decided at a meeting held during the past week by the Portland Fair & Livestock Association, at which the success of the Festival was recounted and considerable enthusiasm aroused. The double tracking of the streetcar line to the fair grounds is considered requisite to the success of future shows and assurances have been given that this will be done by the trolley company as soon as property owners make arrangements to pave portions of the route traversed. It is planned to make next year's show the biggest ever.
