**BURIED ALIVE****By Awful Explosion in Lawson Coal Mine.**

Black Diamond, Wash., Nov. 7.—Fifteen men are entombed in the deepest slope of the Lawson coal mine here today, and all hope of their rescue has been abandoned. The men were caught in the mine when a terrific explosion closed all entries to the levels yesterday morning. The Lawson mine is one of the deepest in the United States. The property, valued at a quarter of a million dollars, is badly damaged. The Pacific Coast Coal company officers are at a loss to understand the cause of the disaster. At 6 o'clock yesterday morning the night fire boss, Cohn, came to the surface and reported "all went below."

There were then 15 men in the mine. Five minutes later a terrific explosion occurred and flying timbers spurted out of the mouth of the mine. Four men, standing at the shaft-house, were badly injured.

**THE ELECTION****Democratic Gains in East. West Elected Governor. Jones Elected Sheriff, Balance of County Ticket Republican.**

Returns from the east indicate large Democratic gains in many states. The next congress will be in control of the democrats by a majority of 21.

In this state, Bowerman, republican candidate for governor is defeated by West, democrat, by about 6,000 majority. The balance of state officers elected are republican. The republican nominees for congress in both districts are elected.

Most of the constitutional amendments and proposed measures are defeated. The normal school bills carried by a small majority. The prohibition amendment was defeated by about twelve thousand majority.

In the county, the whole republican ticket was elected with the exception of sheriff, by varying majorities.

For sheriff, Wilbur A. Jones of Jacksonville democrat, was elected over J. H. Bellingher republican, of Medford, by about 900 majority.

For commissioner, Davis, Myers, and Patterson made a sharp three cornered fight with Davis in the lead by some 200 votes and Patterson second.

Judge F. M. Calkins; Clerk Coleman; Treasurer Cronmiller; and Surveyor Grisez; had no opposition and will therefore succeed themselves.

**Purdin Enters Rogue Magazine Company.**

Lynn Purdin, who has been publishing the Central Point Globe here for several months has decided to suspend the publication and will enter the magazine field in Medford. The Rogue Magazine which was started two years ago by Arthur Brown, of Medford, has been incorporated by Arthur Brown, Lynn Purdin and F. B. Waite, of Roseburg. It is understood that Mr. Purdin will remove his printing plant to Medford and will issue the magazine from there after December 1. Mr. Brown who has brought the magazine to its present place as a popular monthly, announces that the publication will be enlarged to 60 pages at once and many new features will be added. The Herald wishes the new firm unbounded prosperity.—Herald.

**PORTLAND LETTER.****Dates are Fixed for Oregon Development League Convention. Medford Scores. Rose Festival June 5.**

Portland, Or., Nov. 8 (Special).—Salem will play host to the convention of the Oregon Development League, which will be held at the Capital City November 28, 29 and 30. Invitations are being prepared by Secretary Chapman of the League and will be sent out soon to the various Oregon commercial bodies having membership in the parent body.

The coming meeting promises to be attended by a large number of delegates from every part of the state. The Oregon Development League has accomplished a great deal in bringing the different sections of the state to realize the common interest that binds them all together and this splendid organization promises to accomplish much in advancing the interests of the commonwealth as a whole.

A program that offers much of interest has been arranged. Salem people are going to hand out a brand of hospitality unsurpassed anywhere for the enjoyment of delegates in attendance. A big banquet will be the closing feature of the sessions. Automobile rides and visits to state institutions are planned.

Medford scored during the past week when a car of yellow Newtown apples entered by that city, carried off first prize at the Canadian National Apple Show at Vancouver, B. C. The same exhibit won third prize in the sweepstakes contest, despite the many exhibits entered by Canadian apple growers and those of Northwest states. This showing is a splendid one and indicates that Southern Oregon fruit will offer keen competition at Spokane, as well as at the Portland apple show.

Real estate men of the state plan a federation whose objects are to protect the members and bring about a better understanding between the buying and selling public. There are between 4,000 and 5,000 persons engaged in selling real estate in Oregon and it is thought an association would miss an opportunity to secure the highly effective machine for advancing the interests of realty men throughout the state, as well as aiding the development of the whole commonwealth.

Oregon fir will be used for the decks of the world's largest steamship, the keel for which has been laid at Stettin, Germany. The ship Omega has reached the harbor for the lumber required, which is 2,000,000 feet. The new liner will be operated between America and Europe by the Hamburg-American line and will have a speed of 22 knots. She will be of 45,000 tons gross register, with a length of 880 feet, beam 96 feet, and will have accommodations for 5,000 passengers.

Dates of the Fifth Annual Rose Festival have been fixed by the management for the week beginning June 5, 1911. Next year's Festival, say the officials, will be the most splendid in the history of the city. New features are being planned and next year's show will undoubtedly outdo anything of the kind heretofore held.

**Obituary.**

Mr. David Cronmiller was a native of Pennsylvania. He was born in Center Co. of that state on Oct. 24th 1829 aged 81 years and one day. He came to Oregon in 1862 and located in Jacksonville, where he has since lived, and where he successfully pursued the blacksmith business until about seven years ago when the coming infirmities of age caused him to retire from the same.

He was married to Miss Anna Harrison in Nov. 10, 1861, in Crescent City. There were born to them four children all of whom survive—They are James Cronmiller, Misses Kate and Mamie Cronmiller, of Jacksonville and Mrs. Carrie Horton of Fillmore, Calif.

Mrs. Cronmiller died about twelve years ago thus leaving the family without the presence of a mother and the husband bereft of his wife. Mr. Cronmiller was a quiet kindly spoken man of a retiring disposition and of a sympathetic nature. These qualities endeared him to those who knew him. They are very commendable qualities of character, although it seems to me, too rarely to be seen in these days. It is thus I think of this unostentatious, kindly disposed man of Jacksonville. So pleasant and unobtrusive, content to let others storm around if they will, he will pursue the even tenor of his way. His sympathies went out to the unfortunate and those in distress and needing help and who received his help in a quiet way, and none but the recipients, and those who knew him best were the wiser for his quiet benefactions.

And is this not the commendable way for us all to do and not to live a selfish and self centered life. This was with but few exceptions among the noble pioneers of this valley, a true pioneer life. Along these lines these commendable virtues were exemplified, which put to shame some of the questionable piety found in the churches. Thus the true and the false, the good and the bad are everywhere and to some extent enter into the lives of all of us.

Mr. Cronmiller not only possessed many admirable qualities of character by which we cherish the remembrance of him, but we mourn his sudden departure from among us as one whom we shall miss as a man and as a citizen beloved. We shall miss from our ranks his kindly face, and his pleasant voice we shall hear no more, but we shall cherish in our hearts the remembrance of him.

In his business relations he was known as an honest and upright man among us and an efficient workman in his calling by which his business was maintained all these years, which itself is a great deal to say of any man. But it is chiefly of his gentle forbearing ways and his pleasant quiet demeanor that he impresses his personality upon us that we shall never forget.

**SAN FRANCISCO NEWS****Pacific Coast Congress Will Meet Nov. 18-19**

A Pacific Coast Congress will meet in San Francisco November 17, 18 and 19. Various topics of vital interest to the West will be discussed. Governors, Senators, Representatives and prominent men from the Pacific Slope states will attend, and the matter of the exposition site, and the influences at work on it, will be discussed and decided upon. The West, it is said, has done her part in securing benefits for the balance of the nation, but her own requests have not met with flattering consideration. The West is going to meet and talk it over before Congress meets this December.

Why should the Middle West vacillate in the support to be given the Exposition City when the issue is so plain?
