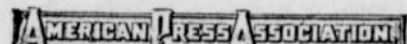

## PORTLAND LETTER.

Oregon Development League convention gives new life to state—Centennial at Astoria next year.

Portland, Or., Dec. 8. (Special)—Benefits following the Oregon Development League convention last week at Salem will be state wide. Probably never before in Oregon's history has there been manifested such spontaneous enthusiasm for a greater state. Every delegate from the 62 Oregon communities represented went back home with new resolves, determined to accomplish greater things for the state.

"The knowledge and courage delegates will take back to their homes is one of the great results of the convention," said C. C. Chapman, secretary-treasurer of the League. "The meeting was a tremendous success from every standpoint, but the greatest accomplishment of all was the bringing together of 62 communities and unifying them for a tremendous campaign of development."

Oregon's revenues from the sale of timber in the national forests for the fiscal year ending June 30, amount to \$39,635.87, which is an increase of about 50 per cent over last year's receipts.

McMinnville will plant roads leading to the city with walnut trees for a distance of at least a mile from town, making that place truly the walnut center of Oregon.

Astoria has plans well along for its 1911 Centennial. The project has been launched with considerable enthusiasm and attention will be attracted to it from all parts of the United States. The celebration of the planting of the first American colony on the Pacific Coast will appeal to the whole country and the anniversary can be easily made of national interest. Astorians say members of the Astor family will participate in the celebration.

This is prize year for Oregon, and the taking of premiums at outside shows seems to have no end. Hood River not only took the first prize at Spokane for apples but followed it up with capturing the sweepstakes at Chicago in competition with the whole country. Medford took first prize at the Canadian National Apple Show at Vancouver, B. C., a Madras man took first honors at the Dry Farming Congress at Spokane with an exhibit, and now comes a Heppner stock breeder who receives the highest average price paid for Shorthorn cattle at the International Livestock Show at Chicago. One two-year-old heifer sold for \$675. The average price received was \$350.

Intensive development of the Willamette Valley is assured on a great scale. The Oregon Power Company is undertaking extensive improvements and extensions to its plant throughout the valley that will mean an expenditure of \$1,500,000. Electric and gas lighting plants in the various cities will be enlarged and many water powers developed.

The second semi-annual State Threshers Convention will be held at LaGrande Dec. 9 and 10 and every thresherman and grain grower in the state is invited to attend. Bills to be submitted to the coming Legislature in the interest of threshermen will be framed and many matters of common interest discussed. Good roads legislation will be given considerable attention.

One of the largest apple orchards in the county, 70 acres, is now being set out by "Our Land company," composed of a number of Eugene business men, on Fern Ridge.
