The trial of Mock is over and another chapter in the criminal history of Jackson county is written. The verdict of the jury meets with approval of most people although some expected a verdict of first degree murder. The trial was fair and impartial from start to finish, the rights of the accused were amply protected at every point and although an able attorney done all in his power to show mitigating circumstances and to lessen the punishment the fact remained unquestioned that an atrocious and unwarranted crime had been committed and that the perpetrator merited the punishment which he will receive. The history of this crime and the events leading up to it contains a valuable lesson in regard to the importance of small things: the loss of Smith's life and Mock's liberty can be traced to a quarrel about a dog, probably of no value to anyone.

CIRCUIT COURT

State of Oregon vs. Julian A. Mock indicted by the grand jury for the murder of Jesse Smith. Defendant having plead not guilty, the case came on regularly for trial, jury empaneled and sworn, testimony of witnesses taken, arguments of counsel, charge to jury, etc. Jury after being out five hours returned a verdict of murder in the second degree.

State of Oregon vs. John O'Connor. Indicted by the grand jury for the larceny of an animal. Defendant plead not guilty. Case set for trial January 23, 1911.

State of Oregon vs. Antone Duprey. Indicted for disturbing a religious meeting. Defendant plead guilty. Court imposed the minimum fine of \$10.

Charles H. Healey vs. A. W. Thomas. Action to recover money. Jury trial. Verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$250.

Trail Lumber Co. vs. J. E. Culver. Defendant given ten days in which to further plead.

L. L. Angle vs. John W. Smith, et al. Dismissed upon stipulation of the parties.

DISINFECT RENTED HOUSES.

Landlord Should Disinfect Before Renting Houses

The following extract from announcement made by the Michigan State Health Department in regard to disinfection of rented houses should receive the careful perusal of both the landlords and tenants of rented houses.

"A very wholesome practice that bids fair to become an established custom, is the disinfection of a rented house before a family moves into it. This is done now, where a case of every contagious disease, say smallpox, or diphtheria, has been known to exist; but how can we feel sure that the house we are about to move into and live in, has not had in it an unrecognized or a suppressed case of measles, or tuberculosis, or typhoid fever? Disinfection after these diseases is of the highest importance. Then, again, there are those diseases that are not fatal, perhaps, but being communicable, may become certainly afflictions, nuisances. This precaution, therefore, should be demanded of landlord, by those who are planning to rent the house."
