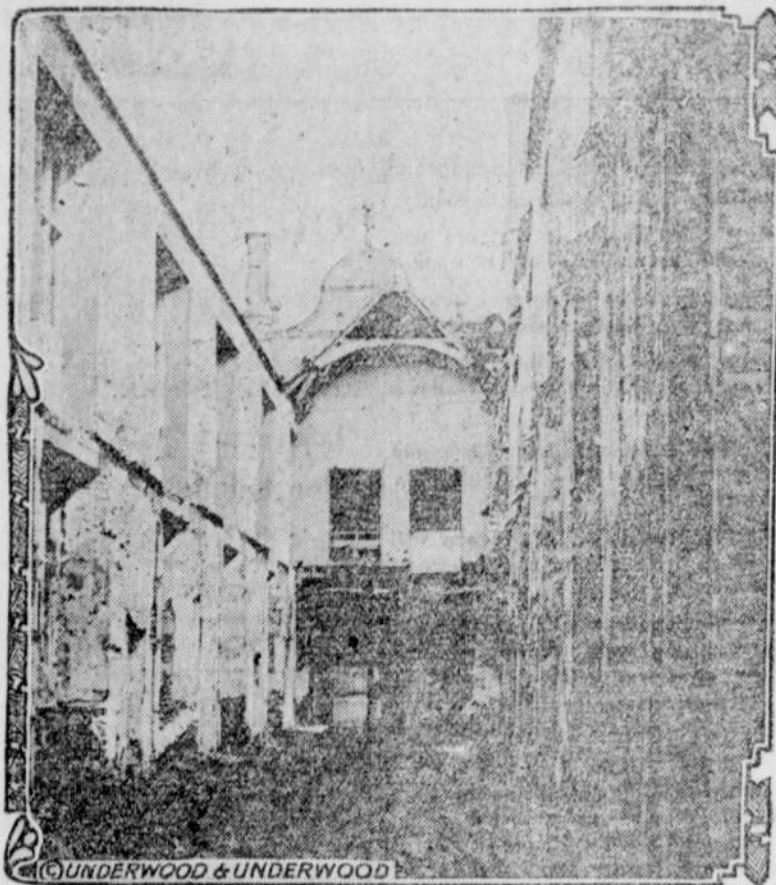


The Drexel Millions to Restore Glories of Kirby Hall

Information has been received from Ulen, Sutherlin Co. that owing to the recent amendments to the constitution of Oregon, their attorney has advised them not to accept the water bonds purchased last fall. It seems to us that the company should be compelled to abide by the terms of their contract made before the amendments to the state constitution were adopted. In the meantime an effort is being made to place the bonds with capitalists at home, several parties have expressed their willingness to purchase one or more each and it is probable that the entire issue will be disposed of in a few days. Those who are able to purchase one or more of the bonds should show their faith in the city and its future by promptly coming to the aid of the council in this dilemma.

Among the many bills introduced in the legislature during the week is one providing for the closing of all places of business except drug stores, restaurants and hotels, on Sunday. If the provisions of the bill are such as stated in the daily papers it should be promptly turned down. The person who wishes to desist from labor on Sunday has a perfect right to do so and his wishes should be respected, but to attempt to tie up all business, travel, etc. because of the prejudice of a few narrow minds is preposterous. We do not believe that the people of Oregon want such a law.
