GIVEN A COMMISSION

As Second Lieutenant in U. S. Army.

The following article appeared in a recent issue of the Washington Post. Lieutenant Lackford is a nephew of Mrs. Geo. E. Neuber of this city. His many friends are glad to hear of his success.
 Capt. Frank D. Lackland, the only officer of the District National Guard who successfully passed the recent examination conducted at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., yesterday was notified that he will be given a commission as second lieutenant in the United States army. Capt. Lackland stood fourth on the list in a class of 31.
 Capt. Lackland is one of the best known of the younger officers of the District National Guard. When he left high school a few years ago he enlisted in the militia, and it was but a short time till he passed an examination for a commission. He received a second lieutenantcy, and later, on promotion as first lieutenant, was given command of Company K, Second infantry, known as the Y. M. C. A. Cadets.
 For the last several months he has held a captaincy, and has commanded Company E. He has occupied prominent positions on the brigade rifle teams, and on the Congress Heights rifle range, where the District militia is taught to shoot, he has made several records as a marksman.

VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFF

Prof. Cudihy Found Guilty of Assaulting Seely Hall.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. J. P. Cudihy, of the Medford High School, charged with committing an assault on Seely Hall, a pupil of the school, came up for trial before Justice Dox in this city Tuesday. The defendant demanded a jury trial, and the following named persons were empaneled as jurors: John Dunnington, E. H. Thompson, John Beavenue, Alex. Norris, Chas. H. Basye and F. M. Tungate.

From the evidence submitted it appears that young Hall who was somewhat late for a recitation before Prof. Cudihy, entered the recitation room in rather noisy manner and was remonstrated with by the professor and finally ordered to leave the room which after several requests to do so, it seems he did.
 The professor followed into the hall placing his hands on Hall's chin and neck, for as he claims, the purpose of making Hall look up. This is denied by the prosecuting witness who claims that Cudihy choked him and then struck him on the side of the head; several blows were then struck on each side after which the combatants appeared in Prof. Collins room, both their faces covered with blood and bearing evidence of a lively encounter.
 One of the witnesses drew a distinction between a fight and a scuffle in these words: "When both are exchanging blows and each hitting the other, it is a fight. When one does it all and the other cannot protect himself, it is a scuffle."
 Much testimony was introduced which had no real bearing on the case. The hearing of testimony occupied the time until 4:15, after which addresses to the jury were delivered by B. F. Mulkey for the State, and F. J. Newman attorney for the defense.
 The jury retired at 5:30, returning in 20 minutes with a verdict of guilty. We understand that the sentence imposed is that Cudihy pay a fine of \$25, and the costs of the trial, amounting in all to \$51. It is rumored that he will take an appeal to the circuit court.
