Judging by the appearance of the columns of some of our contemporaries the crop of spring poets is unusually abundant this year.

The writer had an interview with the mayor and several councilmen Thursday, and they assure us that negotiations for the sale of the water bonds are progressing nicely; that in about sixty days affairs will be in shape to proceed with the construction of the system as planned.

With good schools, churches, telephone, electric light, railway, business establishments of various kinds, and an ideal climate there is no reason why the population of this city should not increase 50 per cent in the next two years. Tell your friends and acquaintances about it in every letter you write. Do it now.

Every citizen of the town should insist upon the early completion of the water system, it will be needed very much in a few weeks. Given an abundant supply of water for sprinkling, irrigation, and sewer purposes the future prospects of the city will advance at least 50 per cent, but if the matter is kept back and delayed much longer we are liable to lose the benefit of the attention already drawn to the city by the improvements made during the past two years. Considerable attention has been attracted to our little city in the outside world; many persons of wealth and standing have become aware of the efforts being made to secure water and have indicated an intention to become residents as soon as the water system becomes an absolute certainty. Several of these parties admit the natural advantages of Jacksonville and have declared their intention to spend considerable money in the construction of handsome, permanent homes within the city provided that an adequate water supply is assured. Without the water they refuse to build and consequently will soon begin to look elsewhere for locations meeting their requirements. There is no middle ground, it is either advance or retreat.

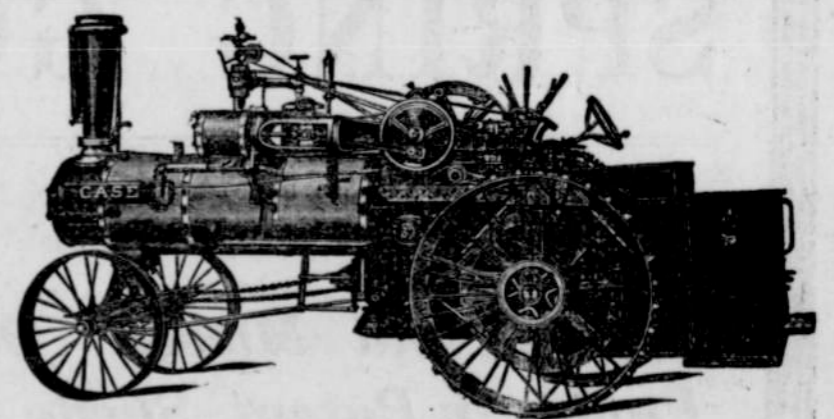
