## COUNCIL MEETING

Held Tuesday evening. Bills allowed. Grade of Third street sidewalk ordered raised.

The regular meeting of the city council convened in the city hall, Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. Present: Mayor Shaw; Councilmen Britt, Dunford, Fick and Grieve, Recorder Dox. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. The usual bills for labor, material, etc. presented, audited and ordered paid.

The question of grade for sidewalk on Third street along Block 7, was discussed at some length; Mr. Elksnat contending that the walk recently constructed did not conform to the grade as established by the city engineer. After considerable discussion the matter was finally adjusted by ordering the grade raised two inches to conform to the sidewalk already built.

The bond of E. H. Helms, applicant for saloon license was approved and the recorder directed to issue license.

The matter of amending the charter was discussed in an informal manner but no definite action was taken upon the matter.

Council adjourned to meet at call of the mayor.

### On Labor Union Crimes.

Arrests of union labor men for blowing up the building of a Los Angeles newspaper with dynamite and incidentally killing many persons, are reported this week quite sensationally. If these men are guilty, no considerations of mercy not applicable to every criminal can be reasonably invoked in their behalf. Such crimes are diabolical under all circumstances in which they are committed with deliberation. They are a menace to society; they endanger the non-combatant; they put labor organization at a disadvantage which the legitimacy of its purpose can ill afford to bear in its already unequal contest with monopoly; and they make the way increasingly difficult for equitable adjustments of industrial relations through political agencies.

The atrocity of the alleged offense, however, will not prejudice fair minds against the persons arrested until their guilt is proved beyond the reasonable

doubt which the law reasonably requires. This proof has not yet been made public in the present instance. The private detective who vouches for its sufficiency has heretofore borne a fair reputation, and this counts against his prisoners; but the dime novel stories of incriminating evidence and efforts at rescue, which some of his assistants seem to be shedding, should tell in the prisoners' favor.—The Public April 28.

### LIGHT PLANT BURNS

At Winchester. Roseburg Without juice. Loss \$50,000 Insurance \$12,000.

Roseburg, Or., May 1.—Roseburg is without electric power to lay, as fire last night totally destroyed the Winchester plant of the Roseburg Water & Light company. The loss is given out as about \$50,000 with \$12,000 insurance. Everything was ruined with the possible exception of one steam engine. The fire started in the engine room.

Kendall Bros., who own the plant, also maintain a small auxiliary plant in the south part of Roseburg. This will furnish the city with water and some lights until the plant can be rebuilt. Newspaper offices and other places where electric power is used are busy today installing gasoline engines.

### Dope for the Fans.

Last Sunday the J. A. C. Team journeyed to Medford and were taken into camp by the fast Crater Lake team of that place. The boys played a rattling good game, but was unable to overcome the lead secured by the Crater Lakes early in the game.

Each team has a game to the good now. The rub will be pulled off in Jacksonville in the near future and a good crowd should be on hand to cheer the boys on to victory, because they are sure going to win.

The fans should turn out and help the boys along. They are putting up as good a brand of ball as the rest of the teams around here and besides have a very well balanced team.

Next Sunday they journey to Applegate to try and add another victory to their already good record.

Manager McGraw Fulton says he will spare no pains to put out a winning team. All they need is the support of the fans and a good team can be had.

### RICH STRIKE

Near Selma has yielded \$110,000 says news Letter of May 1.

Grants Pass, Or., May 1.—C. L. Magnum, a widely known western mining authority who has just returned from the strike at the Higgins mine at the summit of Slide and Rancharie creeks, 20 miles northwest of Selma, says the gold was found in an immense ledge of quartz porphyry between andesite and serpentine. The ledge was stripped of 300 feet of gold found at the top where erosion and disintegration had taken place. The material was shoveled into sluice boxes and recovered by the use of Hungarian riffles.

Higgins, the owner, and Messrs. Gage and Ross, lessors, have received by this process 11 tons of gold concentrates, averaging fully \$10,000 per ton. Active mining has ceased for the present, pending purchase of the property by J. M. McPhee, of Portland, who has an option until May 12. With development it is regarded as promising a very rich property. Other properties near are showing very rich.

### FREE LEAFLET

On evils of forest fires. Distributed free to school children.

To educate the younger generation to the importance of forest protection and also enlist its aid in bringing the subject before the parents, a striking illustrated leaflet on the forest fire evil is being placed in the hands of almost every school child on the Pacific Coast by the Western Forestry & Conservation Association. Probably no single piece of printed matter has ever had equal circulation in the west, for arrangements are already made for the distribution of 350,000 in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. The project has the endorsement of the state authorities, who are co-operating in its distribution before the spring term closes. On one cover the leaflet has a colored picture of a settler's home being destroyed by flames, on the other a forest scene where fire has not occurred. The text consists of questions and answers concerning need and methods of saving life and property from forest fire destruction.

### PORTLAND LETTER.

Central Oregon May Form Development League of Its Own. Minting Congress May 16-18.

Portland, Or., May 2 (Special)—To form a Central Oregon Development League, that shall be a wheel, to work for the advancement of that particular part of the state, is the latest project along publicity lines. Secretary C. C. Chapman, of the Oregon Development League, has been at work formulating plans for such an organization and the Prineville Commercial Club will probably issue a call soon for a conference of the commercial bodies of Central Oregon on the subject.

It is expected that Madras, Metolius, Redmond, Bend, Prineville and other Central Oregon cities will unite under one head to work together for the interests they all have in common and that a great deal will be accomplished in settling the vacant lands of the interior. It is hoped to unite various factions by this means and create a brotherhood of active communities that will mean much for the entire region.

May 1, always a notable date in northwest history, was observed this year with appropriate exercises at Champoug, upon the historic ground where 63 years ago the foundations of civil government on the Pacific were laid. The Oregon Pioneer Association and the Native Sons of Oregon had charge of the observance of the anniversary.

The cutting of burned cedar poles has become quite an industry in Coos and Curry counties. Last year an experimental order was given for the burned over piling by the Santa Fe Railroad. The timber was found to be satisfactory and there is a big demand for it. There are large quantities of burned over cedar in the forests of the coast counties and it has been found still serviceable even 40 years after the trees were killed by fire.

The Oregon Mining Congress, that meets in Portland May 16-18, will bring together a large number of men interested in this industry. Many parts of the west will be represented. It is intended to arouse greater interest in mining, an activity that has been neglected to a considerable extent in this state.

A new alignment of good roads forces was made during the past week

at a meeting in Portland when steps were taken to organize a state-wide good roads association with county branches. The former Oregon Good Roads Association was dissolved, after all its affairs had been wound up. By means of the new organization it is expected to secure co-operation throughout Oregon to accomplish its objects. Sentiment for good roads legislation will be aroused.

Roseburg's Strawberry Carnival, May 11, 12 and 13, has attracted attracted attention throughout western Oregon during the past week. A committee made a visit to Portland and secured the promise of a special train from the metropolis on May 11, Portland Day.

Klamath Falls is turning its attention to beautifying the city and its environs. Efforts will be made to have property owners plant shade trees and improve the appearance of the community in other ways. The west is getting over its frontier days and is generally interested in adding to its attractiveness wherever possible.

### FOREST FIRES

New forestry laws can be had upon application to State Forester at Salem.

Forest fires, one of the greatest sources of destruction to the most valuable resource of the state, will soon be restricted and their terrors largely reduced if the people will co-operate with the State Forester in the administration of the new forestry law enacted by the last Legislature, which will be ready for distribution in pamphlet form in the near future.

One of the most important provisions of the law is that making a closed season for burning from June 1 to

October 1, during which period outdoor fires of all kinds are prohibited except under most stringent regulations and the probability of heavy penalties.

In this connection the State Forester urges upon every one the necessity of doing all possible burning before the closed season begins and thus save the trouble and risk of doing it by permission during that season of greatest danger when fire spreads so easily and rapidly.

The State Forester desires the assistance and co-operation of every one in the protection of property from forest, grass or brush fires, and to this end invites suggestions and information calculated to assist in any manner in the performance of his most important duties.
