WOODMEN CABIN

Built on State Fair Grounds at Salem. Will be Dedicated Later.

Salem, Ore., May 9.—Fifty-eight campers of Woodmen of the World participated Sunday in the erection of the cabin of the state order at the fair grounds, and to the order belongs the distinction of having constructed the first headquarters of any order in the state on what has been set apart by the fair management as "Fraternity" street.

The event had long been looked forward to by members of the order, and extensive preparations had been made. The public in general looked forward to it and the grounds were well filled in the afternoon with people when the initiatory ceremony occurred.

A feature of the forenoon program was the flag raising, which was witnessed by hundreds of people. Subsequent to it James Rudin, past consul of the Multnomah camp, delivered an address to the women, and upon its conclusion a banquet was served by Silver Bell circle, Women of Woodcraft, of this city, and in which about 500 participated.

Under the partially completed roof of the cabin at 4 o'clock, Governor West and Secretary of State Olcott were initiated into the order and took the obligation. The ceremony was beautiful and particularly impressive and was witnessed by several thousands of people.

The dedication of the cabin will be held the second day of the fair.

FROM CORVALLIS.

Kansas City Superintendent Will Give Course of Lectures

Corvallis, Ore., May 11.—It has just been announced that City Superintendent of Schools J. M. Greenwood of Kansas City will give a course of instruction in the Oregon Agricultural College summer session this year. Prof. E. D. Ressler, in charge of the program, has just received Mr. Greenwood's acceptance, with the statement that he will be in Corvallis in time for the week of July 17-21, after he has delivered his addresses at the National Educational Association convention in San Francisco.

Much special interest attaches to the announcement of this course in school supervision, with lectures on some of the larger educational problems, since Mr. Greenwood is a well-known authority on the subject. He has been one of the leading members of the N. E. A. for a generation, and for six years past has held the superintendency of the Kansas City schools, which rate very high, especially in the matter of graduation. Mr. Greenwood was one of the first to work out a scheme whereby the brighter pupils of the schools could finish the work in seven years.

Mr. Greenwood was a friend and associate of the late Dr. William J. Harris, U. S. Commissioner of Education, and was chosen to deliver the eulogy on Dr. Harris at the N. E. A. He has contributed numerous articles of interest and value to the various national educational journals.

For the public school teacher's course the college has secured the services of the leading experts of the Portland schools. City Superintendent Frank Rigler and his First Assistant, D. J. Grout, will both give courses in supervision and methods; Principal F. S. Ball will lecture on intermediate grade methods, and Principal A. Alexander will lecture from her fund of experience on primary methods.

Instructors of unusual ability have also been secured to teach the many other branches to be included in the summer session program.

Gumption on the Farm.

Old earth is never late on its rounds. It arrives on time because it keeps on moving. A good example for all of us who are engaged in eradicating its surface for sustenance and shelter.

You can't overlook the harvest. Be sure your wife will find you out. That weed right in the hill is your worst enemy.

Don't let the weeds get a start—kill 'em while they are a-borning. Easiest way.

Too often the extravagant who start

out in the parlor-car come back in the freight.

When you hoe corn, thin it out to not more than three good stalks to the hill. Nature doesn't like to be crowded.

It isn't the mark of a good teamster to get off the road late at night, nor to leave the horses uncurried for two or three days.

A cheerful spirit gets on quick. A grumbler in the mud will stick.

It is less work to hoe twice soon after the crops come up than it is to hoe once after the weeds get high, and it does much more good.

Borrowing tools, and sending them home dull or rusty, doesn't make the other fellow grin. Better save up and buy your own.

Again we say: Test the seed-corn before planting, for there's much poor seed in the country this year. And also, treat the seed potatoes to prevent scab.

If you put stones under the posts of your corn house, have them thick enough and large enough so that the frost will not get below them and break them to pieces.

Don't cultivate the potatoes when out in bloom, or coming out, unless you want a lot of stunted little tubers. Cultivate them before they get that big, and hoe them clean of weeds.
