**THE GARDINER TRIAL**

In Circuit Court. Verdict Against P. & E. for \$7,500

The action of Mrs. Gardiner against the Pacific & Eastern railway company for damages was begun in the circuit court Monday morning, the plaintiff being represented by A. E. Reames of Medford, and the defendant company by R. G. Smith of Grants Pass.

The action was for damages sustained by the plaintiff on account of injuries received by Walter Gardiner in a wreck on the Pacific and Eastern railroad in August 1910 and which injuries the plaintiff alleges were the cause of the death of said Walter Gardiner at a later date.

Almost the entire forenoon Monday was occupied in selecting a jury, after which the taking of testimony was commenced and continued during the afternoon until 4:40 when a recess was taken until 9 A. M. Tuesday morning when the trial was resumed.

The examination of witnesses for the plaintiff lasted until 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when the plaintiff rested and the defense introduced evidence intended to show that the collision was not the proximate cause of the death of Walter Gardiner and that the trouble or affection from which the latter suffered and to relieve which trouble the operation at Portland was performed, existed long prior to the date of the collision in August 1910.

The evidence introduced was somewhat contradictory in many respects and certain parts of it would appear to a layman as irrelevant and immaterial to the matters at issue and consisting largely of the testimony of expert witnesses among whom were several eminent specialists from Portland and other places.

The taking of testimony for defense closed at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, after which Mr. Reames, attorney for the plaintiff addressed the jury for a period of about one hour. He was followed by Mr. Smith for the defense who occupied the period up to closing time.

Thursday morning Mr. Smith resumed his address to the jury, closing at about 11 o'clock. He occupied the following hour in an address to the court upon the law of evidence. Court then declared a recess until one o'clock.

After the noon recess, Mr. Reames made the closing argument for the plaintiff and Judge Calkins in a few well formed sentences briefly explained to the jury the law as applicable to this particular case and submitted the cause for their consideration. The jury retired and after a short time returned a verdict for the plaintiff.

**Funeral of Mrs. Hoffman.**

The funeral of Mrs. Laura Ellen Hoffman was held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from her late residence on California street.

Rev. Van Clarenbeck of Medford was in charge of the ceremonies conducted at the residence and at the grave. Interment was had in the beautiful cemetery on the hill overlooking this valley.

A number of floral offerings were sent by friends of the deceased; a large cortege attended the remains to the final resting place.

The pallbearers were James M. Cronemiller, John F. Miller, William Grieve, Robert Dow, James Rock, and S. E. Dunnington.
